COLONISTS ARRIVE FROM EAST HALLOWE'EN COMES ON SUNDAY

LARGE PARTY OF WISCONSINIANS COME TO SETTLE IN THE TREASURE STATE.

When is Halloween? This is a question that is giving the small boy some trouble. As is well known, Halloween is celebrated on the last day of October, but, as luck would have it, the last day of October this year falls on Sunday, and, of course, there can be no Halloween frolics on that day.

The party arrived in the city last Thursday evening in their special car and, taking with them Otto Maurer, of the real estate firm of Maurer & Kirschwing, as surveyor, they went out Friday morning to examine the land upon which they later filed, each filed upon 20 acres of land under the enlarged homestead act, the party securing seven solid sections of land and four fractional sections, making nine sections in all. After being located by Mr. Maurer they came back yesterday to Great Falls and made their filings in the local land office.

A majority of the party will leave this afternoon for Wisconsin, and will immediately arrange to come to Montana and prove up on their claims. Two of the party will remain in the city owing to their failure to make filings. They found that the claims they selected had been filed upon, when they arrived at the local land office. Members of the expedition stated yesterday that they expected a great number from their vicinity would follow them to Montana and select claims in their neighborhood. The party is composed of 16 men and six women, all of them being people of refinement and means, who realize the value of land. While in the city several of the visitors drove out to the experimental farm and saw the results of dry farming. They also visited the farmers' market and were very favorably impressed by the quantity and quality of the farm produce offered for sale by the farmers, nearly all of which was produced by dry farming.—Great Falls Tribune.

When, Then?
The question now arises as to when the celebration shall take place—Saturday night or Monday night—and there is, of course, a difference of opinion. Some favor Saturday night, others Monday night, but a poll of the small boy portion of the population would probably show a disposition to celebrate both nights, and consequently draw out the tortures of corn night and cabbage night and all the other nights that center around Halloween to unholy lengths.

Saintly Origin.
Though Halloween has degenerated in more modern days into something approaching a night of rowdiness, the day, nevertheless, had a distinguished origin.

Along about the fourth century the number of saints in the calendar had increased to such an extent that there were not days enough in the year to accommodate them all, so a day was set apart to be observed as "Saints' day," or, as it is called in the English church, All Hallows' Day. The day set apart was November 1, consequently the evening preceding became known as Hallow-even, later corrupted into Halloween.

A Blending.
By chance, All Hallows' was made to fall at about the same time as the celebration of one of the three Druid festivals in honor of the sun-god. Little by little, the two festivals blended together and as a result Halloween came to be a sort of day for devotion, especially among the English. Why this is so is more or less of a mystery, though it is probably a survival of the old Druid belief that at the date of their autumn festival the gods bade good-bye to the north and the lands of darkness prevailed.

Aged Holiday.
Halloween, barring New Year's, is the oldest of the holidays, even Christmas, coming, as it does, from the 16th century, being a youngster compared with it.

A strange fact connected with Halloween is that there is no known explanation of the peculiarly American custom of making Halloween a night of rowdiness.

BUILDING WRECKED BY USE OF DYNAMITE

Indianapolis, Oct. 25.—Four buildings in different parts of the city were wrecked last night by explosions of dynamite, caused, according to the police by labor troubles. The contractor against whom the wrecking was directed was Albert Van Speckelson, who is building a Mystic Shrine temple and theater. Two automobiles and two horses were destroyed in the explosions.

A branch telephone office, under construction by him in the suburb of Irvington was badly damaged and the Van Speckelson planing mill was damaged. A branch of the public library being built by Van Speckelson was damaged to the extent of \$1,000.

BIG CONSIGNMENTS OF FRUIT SHIPPED

Spokane, Oct. 25.—Apple growers in eastern Washington are sending large consignments of fruit to various parts of the United States. Advises received by the Spokane Chamber of Commerce are that the shipments from the Wenatchee valley, in central Washington, average 10 cars a day and that this will continue 60 days. Growers in the Yakima valley and districts tributary to it are also sending out large shipments to eastern markets. Prices are high and firm, ranging from \$2.25 for Delicious to \$1.50 for Jonathans. Winesaps, the best crop harvested in the Wenatchee valley in years, are quoted at \$2.50 while other varieties, such as Grimes' Golden, Spitzenbergs and Wagners, range from \$2.25 to \$3 a box of 24 pounds. The crop in eastern Washington is short this season, but the quality is the best in the history of the industry.

EXTRA LARGE CLASS TAKES EXAMINATIONS

Thirty-four candidates appeared in the offices of the supervisors of the Bitter Root, Lolo and Missoula national forests in the Hammond block yesterday to take the examination for forest rangers. They completed the written part of the examination early in the afternoon and were then tested in their knowledge of surveying instruments. Those who did not take the latter part of the examination yesterday afternoon will be examined today. Today will be spent by the candidates in the field, where they will disclose their knowledge of how to throw the diamond hitch and a few other technical matters.

The register and receiver of the Missoula land office yesterday took evidence in the case of the United States against Charles E. Burns and Eugene R. Day, involving title to the Mabel lodge and the Mabel fractional lots, in township 20 north of range 21 west, situated in the St. Regis unorganized mining district. The suit was brought by officials of the forest service.

BOXCAR TOURISTS SEEKING THE ARMY BIG SUM INVOLVED IN COURT DECISION

Spokane, Oct. 25.—Boxcar tourists visiting Spokane on the way to and from the Pacific coast and British Columbia and Alberta have seized upon a trick to get wholesome meals and warm baths at the expense of Uncle Sam. Presenting themselves singly and in pairs at the local station they are frequently picked up by likely lumbers for the army, in which event they are instructed to appear for examination on the morrow. Before leaving the station they are given two meal tickets and a disk good for a bath. Nine out of 10 fail to return, leaving the city as soon as they get the meals and bath. The enlisted officer here declares that prosecution by the federal authorities will follow if the men can be apprehended, but so far no arrests have been made. He says that an applicant who accepts food and lodging from the United States and fails to report for examination, after declaring his intention to enlist, lays himself liable to the charge of defrauding the United States.
