William D. Finley, assistant manager and field representative of the National Apple show (Inc.), said this on his return from Missoula, where he arranged to have the prize-winning exhibits at the Western Montana Apple show brought to Spokane for the second exposition, November 15 to 20. He added:

"The Missoula show causes one to marvel and I fully endorse Senator La Follette's remark at the opening ceremonies that 'God has been good to this quarter of the earth.' They have on exhibition nearly three carloads of apples grown in the Bitter Root valley, besides a large plate display, showing more than 25 varieties. IN THE RAILWAY WORLD

JIM HILL PLANNING HUNTERS COME BACK GREAT ROAD EMPTY-HANDED

BURLINGTON EXPECTS TO BUILD NORTH AND SOUTH IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

"I know positively that James J. Hill never wants to own or operate a railroad east of Chicago. That should be the end of the matter. He should effectually dispose of all gossip to the end that Hill is planning to organize a transcontinental system from the Atlantic to the Pacific."

So declared Darius Miller, vice president of the Burlington and Colorado & Southern, the closest business associate of James J. Hill, in an interview with the Denver Post. In a talk to the Post representative Mr. Miller continued:

"Mr. Hill figures that it would be the worst sort of business policy to operate a railroad east of Chicago. Under present conditions all roads feed him, whereas if he only had one line he would lose business and the other roads would oppose him.

"The Burlington, however, will eventually have a through service, via Denver, between Seattle and Galveston."

George H. Harris, president of the Burlington, said:

"I can tell you positively that neither the Burlington nor the Hill interest has in any way secured an interest in the Denver & Rio Grande, the Western Pacific or the Moffat roads. But I will say just as frankly that if any such negotiations were pending I would not tell it to the public."

Mr. Harris and Mr. Miller arrived in Denver this morning on a special train at 9:30 a.m., accompanied by other Hill system officials, says the Post.

Advance reports concerning this journey have been arriving from New York for more than a week, predicting that James J. Hill is planning to construct two mammoth transcontinental systems—one from east to west, the other from Seattle to the Gulf of Mexico.

It has also been announced that Hill is figuring on a dominant interest in the Denver & Rio Grande and the Western Pacific—two Gould roads—and that he is negotiating with David H. Moffat for the purchase of the Moffat road. Moreover, Hill is described as aspiring to build for himself a greater power than that which death took from Edward H. Harriman.

Darius Miller was far more emphatic than President Harris. "I can positively deny," he said, "that Mr. Hill has secured any interest in the Denver & Rio Grande or the Western Pacific, and I know such a thing is not in contemplation. Neither is he figuring on buying the Moffat road or any interest in it.

"I understand that the Moffat road has been financed already, and the Burlington is not in the deal.

"Some day the Burlington will have a north and south service from Seattle to Galveston via Denver—it is bound to come.

"Prosperity seems to reign all over the east at present and business of all kinds is improving. It has been a good year for the railroads and the people as well."

The question of a new private car line to be owned and operated by the Hill interests exclusively, but with shops and headquarters in Denver, will also be settled while those director generals of the Hill millions are here.

The present car famine throughout the west and southwest, which has entailed hardships on Colorado farmers and fruitgrowers, has convinced Hill that more refrigerator cars are needed for this territory.

For some time James J. Hill and his lieutenants have been planning details for the organization and operating company, which could serve at the Hill lines. This would relieve the present embarrassment of having to depend upon the agencies which dominate the refrigerator car trust. Part of the plan is to establish headquarters for the refrigerator line in the Colorado & Southern shops here. It has been estimated that 6,000 cars are necessary and these will cost \$1,500 each—a \$9,000,000 investment in all.

WOMEN ARE INJURED IN STRIKERS' RIOT

New Brunswick, N. J., Oct. 25.—Several hundred women took part in rioting today outside the cigar factory of Hirschbaum & Co., where a strike is in progress, and three women were knocked down and roughly handled before the police could quell the disturbance. Nearly 500 young women, mostly foreigners, left their work Saturday, when their demand for an increase in piece work was refused. A number of American girls declined to join the strikers and were attacked when they attempted to enter the factory today.

TAKING OF EVIDENCE FURTHER POSTPONED

Washington, Oct. 25.—The taking of testimony for the defense in the dissolution of the merger suit of the government against the Union Pacific company and other railroads has been postponed until January 2, according to information received by the attorney general today. The postponement was requested by the defense at Cheyenne, Wyo., Saturday and was granted by Special Counsel Severance of the government. Judge Vandever, of the United States circuit court, granted the postponement on condition that the defense complete their evidence by March 19.
