CONCRETE WORKERS ON THE JOB

OLD DERRICK IS DISMANTLED AND FLOOR LAYERS ARE HALF WAY FINISHED.

The last bit of derrick machinery was taken from the old flat car on the new bridge yesterday and the final phase of construction has begun. A few weeks only remain now before the bridge shall be finally opened to traffic and every hour of work these days marks a long step toward completion. The cement workers are fast making their way across the bed of the bridge and another week or ten days will see this part of the work finished. The concrete floor and sidewalks have been laid as far as the middle of the bridge and the pavement workers will be on the job before many more days. The weather man has so far been most kindly toward the bridge men. Not a single day of rain or storm has blocked their progress since they began on the concrete work and a few more days of fair weather will be all that is needed to take them over.

No one from the old operator who has seen every piece of steel and every bit of concrete laid, to the traveler who sees the bridge for the first time, has anything but kind words to say of it. The bridge is going to be more than a credit to the city and the county and every day makes it look better.
