NEWS OF THE RAILWAY WORLD
PUGET SOUND JOINS STOCKHOLDERS ISSUE ALASKAN RAILROADS
O. R. & N. NEW PAPER COMBINE

EARLING ROAD COMBINES WITH HARRIMAN SYSTEM AGAINST NORTHERN PACIFIC.
CAPITALIZATION OF NEW YORK, A. C. AND A. N. ARE NOW UNDER NEW HAVEN & HARTFORD THE SAME CONTROL—
NOW \$171,000,000. \$30,000,000 CAPITAL.

Lewiston, Idaho, Oct. 27.—Engineer Torsett of the Northern Pacific Railroad company reached Orofino yesterday with a crew of surveyors and experts, as soon as the party is prepared to return to the camp which has been established on the north fork of the Clearwater river above Absahka. Arrangements are being made to keep the crews in the field all winter and at present 60 men are employed in the north fork district by the Hill road.

While they are working with unusual energy, a crew of surveyors in the employ of the Milwaukee is established three miles northwest of Absahka and expects to establish headquarters in Orofino within 10 days.

The Milwaukee forces have completed a survey from Bovill through the Elk creek district, reaching the north fork of the Clearwater at the mouth of Elk creek. That they are establishing lines which will lead to the building of a line from the mouth of Whiskey creek is evident, but a new phase is added to the interesting situation by the fact that one crew is working up the north fork from the mouth of Deer creek, following the Northern Pacific across into the heart of a virgin timber tonnage district.

For several months the Hill forces have been battling with O. R. & N. crews in the middle fork district, running lines from Kootenai to Missoula, but several weeks ago they moved their field of operations to the north fork, running up the river from Absahka, but instead of having this field to themselves they are now harassed by Milwaukee engineers. The Milwaukee is preparing to keep crews in this district all winter, Orofino having been selected as a base for supplies. That the Northern Pacific will be unable to control the extensive tonnage of this rich timber district is apparent, and in view of the fact that the Harriman forces have abandoned the field, while the Milwaukee has invaded an exclusive Hill stronghold, lends color to the rumor that the Earling road and the Harriman system have formed an alliance and it is now believed that the O. R. & N. will build up the Clearwater river from Lewiston to Absahka where a connection will be made with the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound system.

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 27.—The stockholders of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad company this afternoon re-elected the present board of directors. At a special meeting the board of directors was authorized to issue \$30,000,000 of new capital stock, making the total capitalization \$171,000,000. Not one dollar of the charge for legal expenses in the annual report was expended for lobbying, for use of the so-called third house or as payments to politicians, was the declaration of President Charles S. Mellen, at the meeting of the stockholders, replying to a question of a stockholder as to the reports current in Hartford that the road had maintained a lobby at the last session of the general assembly.

GLENDIVE'S EQUIPMENT INCREASED BY RAILWAY

Glendive, Oct. 27.—The Northern Pacific is moving quietly but effectively in its plans for the increase of its traffic facilities at Glendive, incident to the building of the Missouri river road and the increase of business generally. When the railroad land was placed on the market, two full sections, opposite the city, were reserved. Last week that holding was increased by the purchase of four acres from W. B. Foster, and it is stated that this land will be used for the location of the new stock yards. Practically all the stock shipments originate on the north side of the river, anyway. It is understood that the road is also reserving land in the same vicinity for grain elevators. It is now considered certain that the bridge will be constructed above town. The route has been changed, however, so that it will not cut through the new fairgrounds. Right of Way Agent Martin has in his possession blue print maps for the new station facilities, both here and at Miles City. Both depots will undoubtedly be erected next year. The point of greatest interest here is whether the site of the depot will be changed. The man who can secure that question definitely could probably sell his knowledge for a good round sum.

PAPA MONTAGUE SENDS MORE MONEY TO ITALY

Chattanooga, Tenn., Oct. 27.—At noon today was celebrated the marriage of Miss Evelyn Montague of this city, to Count Nerio Rasponi of Ravenna, Italy. Miss Montague is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Preston Montague, her father being a wealthy manufacturer of Chattanooga. She is the second daughter of the family to wed an Italian nobleman, her sister, Miss Mildred, having married Count Passolini Pasolini, a cousin of Count Rasponi, two years ago.

MRS. HARRIMAN SITS IN.

New York, Oct. 27.—That Mrs. E. H. Harriman, who was the sole legatee of her husband's vast estate, intends taking an active part in the management of the fortune left to her, is indicated by the fact that she has leased a suite of offices on Fifth avenue. The offices cover almost the entire second floor and contain rooms for Mrs. Harriman's lawyers and advisers, in addition to the clerical force.

SLADE MAY SUCCEED RESIGNED OFFICIAL

St. Paul, Oct. 27.—C. M. Levy, third vice president of the Northern Pacific, has resigned an account of having been elected director and vice president and general manager of the Western Pacific. Mr. Levy's headquarters in the future will be in San Francisco. An unconfirmed report is current that George T. Slade, now general manager of the Northern Pacific railroad, will succeed Mr. Levy.

Seattle, Oct. 27.—Control of the Alaska Central railroad, which runs from Seward, Alaska, 36 miles northward toward the Yukon river, passed yesterday from F. G. Bennett, trustee for the stockholders of the Sovereign Bank of Toronto to the Alaska Northern railroad company, a \$20,000,000 corporation, which was formed by incorporation under the laws of G. G. Laberge, former United States Senator, George Turner and R. D. Miller all of Spokane, and E. H. Morrison of Fairfield, Wash. Although Laberge refused to confirm the rumor that his company is backed by a syndicate headed by the J. P. Morgan interests, non familiar with the history of the road declare that that is the case. The Alaska Central, after bankruptcy proceedings, was sold at Fairbanks, October 2, by order of the United States court and James Bennett, acting for the stockholders, of the Sovereign bank bought the road for \$20,000,000.

ROBBERS IDENTIFIED.

Orofino, Oct. 27.—Several witnesses here today in the trial of the alleged Union Pacific train robbers positively identified some of the prisoners as having participated in the holdup. G. Whitmore, chief clerk of the hotel near the scene, identified Fred Torgerson as one of the robbers. M. C. Rush, railway mail clerk, identified Fred Torgerson as another.

TEMPERANCE UNION HONORS MISS WILLARD

Orofino, Oct. 27.—The closing day of the 36th annual convention of the National Woman's Christian Temperance union was devoted to reports of organizers and superintendents. The establishment of February 17, the anniversary of the death of Miss Frances Willard, as a special memorial day, at which contributions to the Frances Willard memorial fund are to be made, was the most notable work of the morning session.

TOO MANY WIVES.

Walla Walla, Oct. 27.—Rev. Frederick H. Ward, pastor of the Baptist church at Erewater, Ore., today pleaded guilty to bigamy and was sentenced to five years in the Washington state penitentiary. Ward admitted having wives in North Carolina, Tennessee and Kentucky, besides the one whom he recently married in Oregon.

APPEAL TO BE TAKEN BY U. S. GOVERNMENT

Washington, Oct. 27.—The government will at once institute an appeal from this decision, announced Attorney General Wickersham today in reference to the action of Judge Holt in the circuit court at New York yesterday, sustaining the plea of the state of limitations interposed by the defendants, Kissel and Harned, to the indictment against them jointly with the American Sugar Refining company. Holt's decision was of far reaching consequence.

UNIVERSALIST CHURCH CLOSES CONVENTION

Detroit, Oct. 27.—The biennial general convention of the Universalist church closed here today, after being in session since last Friday. The proposal to continue the organization of the church under a permanent president, who would succeed the president of the convention, was defeated by a close vote. The question will doubtless be brought up at the Springfield, Mass., convention in 1911.

RESOLUTION FAILS.

Detroit, Oct. 27.—An amendment to the constitution of the Universalist church to vest real administrative power in a single head to be known as the president of the Universalist church in the United States failed of adoption today. It lacked only a few votes of the necessary two-thirds majority. The matter accordingly was left over.
