WINSTON COMPANY IN NEW PLAY

"LA BELLE MARIE" WILL BE OFFERING AT FAMILY THEATER THIS WEEK.

Tomorrow the Winston stock company begins the second week of its local engagement in a four-act comedy-drama, "La Belle Marie." The play abounds in pathos and humor.

The story is of a young innocent country girl who knows only that which is good. She meets a city man who becomes in love with her and after winning her love takes advantage of her innocence.

The disgrace kills the girl's father and over his body she swears revenge.

The young girl, to prepare herself for this revenge, goes to France and after a few years returns to America passing herself as a French woman, being known as "La Belle Marie." In this character she becomes a power in the stock market, where she meets her betrayer, George Leighton, who becomes a slave to La Belle. George becoming frantically embarrassed steals money from his father, later placing the blame upon the younger brother, Earl, who, as a result, is turned from his father's home.

During the scenes in the office of the stock broker much comedy is introduced by a stuttering Irish office boy and a snappy American salesman who is always having an engagement to "see a man."

As the action proceeds the revenge of La Belle continues to shape itself, until, as she is about to crush the entire Leighton family, the younger boy, Earl, returns from his travels, discovers La Belle's true name and delivers a message to her from a brother now dead.

In return La Belle spares the boy's family, but redoubles her efforts to revenge herself on George. This she does by inducing him to write a letter offering a large sum of money providing she will leave the country. La Belle accepts the money but instead of leaving she places the letter and all the money she has received from George in his father's hands, showing George and not Earl to be the criminal.

The father is overcome with remorse at the manner in which he treated the younger boy, seeks him out, begs forgiveness, and requests that he return home.

George is then accused of the thefts, denounced and forbidden the shelter of his father's roof. This blow, combined with the fact that he is despised by the woman he loves, causes him to desire to live no longer and he commits suicide.

The news of this deed causes La Belle Marie to show herself in her true character, the power of which is shown in her closing speech, "Not revenge but retribution."

NEW STRIKE MADE IN BIG ELK MINE

A new strike of rich ore in the Big Elk mine is reported by Frank A. Lowe, president of the company who came to Missoula last night from the property. In the upper tunnel of the mine a vein of copper ore three feet wide has been encountered and the assays show that it runs from 25 to 30 per cent copper. According to the statement of Mr. Lowe they have a whole mountain of the ore and the two tunnels that are now being driven into the ore bed are penetrating better ore all the time. At the present there are 12 men at work in the tunnels and they are being driven into the mountain as rapidly as possible. Ore is being sacked for shipment and the road from the mine to the railroad is being completed as rapidly as possible. Shipment of ore will commence as soon as it is possible to do so.
