COMET OBSERVED.

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 1.—A cablegram has been received at Harvard observatory from Kiel stating that Winnick's comet was observed by Poore of La Plata, Argentina, on October 31 about midnight, Greenwich time. It was then in right ascension 17 hours, 11 minutes, 51.6 seconds; declination 27 degrees, 18 minutes, 43 seconds. The comet is visible in a small telescope.

Spokane, Nov. 1.—Three thousand members of the One Hundred and Fifty Thousand club of Spokane have undertaken to swell the attendance at the second National Apple show here, November 12 to 29, by at least 6,000. Each member has pledged himself to accompany not less than 20 persons to the gates during the week of the exposition, or make up the difference out of his own pocket.

BODY ARRIVES.

Tokio, Nov. 1.—The warship Iwate, with the body of Prince Ito aboard, arrived at Yokosuka shortly before 10 o'clock this morning. Among the officials who met the warship were Count Inouye, who was one of Prince Ito's closest friends; M. Katura, the premier; Vice Admiral Baron Minoru Saito and Baron Simeji Goto, minister of communication. The body will be taken to Tokyo by special train.

MYSTERIOUS ROBBERY.

Denver, Nov. 1.—It became known today that Denver police were working on a mysterious robbery, which occurred several nights ago, when mining stocks and other valuable securities to the value of \$15,000 were stolen from the home of Henry Jagels, a wealthy mining man.

One of the theories advanced is that the theft was done by a man and a woman, who followed Jagels from Nevada. Jagels will not discuss the robbery further than to say that the papers stolen were valuable.

WHITE HONORED.

Paris, Nov. 1.—On the occasion of his retirement as ambassador to France, the French government has offered the American Ambassador White the grand cordon of the Legion of Honor, the highest decoration within its gift. Mr. White, however, declined the honor and later explained that he considered the acceptance of such decorations as contrary to the spirit of the best American traditions.

BALLOON ARRIVES.

Bracciano, Italy, Nov. 1.—The dirigible balloon, Onbes, the proprietor of which struck and killed Lieutenant of Engineers Pietro Rovetti as a landing was being made in Rome yesterday, arrived here early today, after an otherwise successful trip to Naples and return.

Stone and Frank Brown, alleged members of the Maybray gang of race-track swindlers and fake prize-fight promoters, who were arrested at San Jose in September, were examined before United States Commissioner E. A. Heacock today and held to answer before the United States district court at Omaha. Bonds for the accused men were placed at \$15,000 each. Being unable to raise the necessary bail, they were remanded to the Alameda county jail.

He had been an invalid for two years. Patrick McMahon, another brother of the murderer, who was held by the police up to Saturday, last, when he suffered a mental collapse, was better today.
- NOT GOOD JURORS. Chicago, Nov. 1.—Porters, cabmen and waiters are not desirable for jurors, according to Jury Commissioner William A. Amberg, who testified here today before judges who are investigating several irregularities in the drawing of venires. "The jury commissioners believe that men who live by accepting tips are not of a character to make good jurors," explained the witness.
