VARSITY BALL TEAM IS CRIPPLED

ENFORCING ELIGIBILITY RULES AND INJURIES TO MEN WORK HARDSHIP.

Handicapped by the loss of several men on account of scholarship deficiencies and with no new material to work on, the state university football team is working hard to keep its lineup good. The players who were injured early in the season have not sufficiently recovered to get back into the game. Coach White is doing his best to build up the team for the final games of the season. In commenting on the team yesterday Coach White said:

"The varsity football team is out for the championship but finds itself out of further recruits to fill the places of men who leave the squad. Vesley is out of the game because of poor scholarship. Conner and Forbis will not be able to return this season. Little and Kennett are being used at ends, but it is doubtful if Little can last a whole game. There are no end substitutes, but Beard is being switched from guard to end.

"Otherwise the team is in good shape and with the proper amount of ginger instilled into the men, it is hoped that a good game will be pulled off with the school of mines on November 12."

The following are the men who have been declared to be eligible to participate in the coming game with Butte, with the provision that a satisfactory standing be maintained in their studies up to the time of the game: Stoddard and Thime, center; Simpson, Beard, Bennett, guards; Ryan and Macleay, tackles; Kennett, Little and Beard, ends; Winstanley and C. Johnson, halves; Itiner, fullback; and Bishop, quarterback.

The action of the athletic committee in certifying to the eligibility of players, caught several of the men on the squad behind in their studies to such an extent that they were considered ineligible for the game with Butte next week. At yesterday's convocation President Dunaway carefully explained to the students the standards of scholarship required by the faculty. The university demands that the football men maintain a satisfactory scholarship record, otherwise they cannot play.

TAFT DEFENDS GAME THAT SCOTCH ENJOY

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 2.—In one of his speeches here today the president sought to defend golf from the charge that it is a rich man's game.

"The game of golf I am not only fond of myself," he said, "but I am serious in thinking that its general spread is a real advance in the matter of hygiene and healthfulness and long life to men between 50 and 70. During the last presidential election it was heralded in the newspapers as being a game indicating aristocratic leaning, that was supposed to injure one in the standing of the 'plain people,' as Lincoln called them. But I am hopeful now that the virtues of golf as a trainer of character and as a leveller instead of an exalter of people will be well understood."

INSANE PRISONER REFUSES TO LEAVE

Frank J. Zweifel, the Milwaukee resident who, while en route from the coast to his home, suddenly lost his head and was taken from the train and placed in the county jail, is still being held in confinement. On Tuesday it was thought that he had recovered his mind, but when about to be placed on board a train he became hysterical and refused to make the trip unless accompanied by a deputy from the local sheriff's office, on the plea that a number of men were after him for the purpose of murder. When brought back to the jail, he begged to be confined in a separate cell, and was accommodated. His relatives in Milwaukee have been notified of his condition.

RYAN CONDEMNS FOOTBALL.

Philadelphia, Nov. 3.—"Football is barbarous and ought to be abolished," said Archbishop Ryan of this city today. "Instead, they should play association football. It is the kind we played when I was at college, where the players kicked the ball and not each other."

Archbishop Ryan's comment was brought out by the death of Michael Burke, a student at the Medico-Chirurgical college, who suffered fatal injuries in a game last Saturday.

RYAN PLEADS GUILTY.

Tom Ryan, arrested a few days ago for throwing a cuspidor through a window of the Exchange saloon, on West Front street, was arraigned before Justice of the Peace Dyson yesterday afternoon and pleaded guilty to the offense. He will be sentenced today.

IMPROVEMENT WORK TO CONTINUE

NORTHERN PACIFIC WILL NOT LET UP ON POLICY FOR BETTER TRACK.

"During the ensuing 12 months the Northern Pacific will continue its policy of strengthening the roadbed in every way, so as to give the safest and most expeditious movement of passengers and freight," is the announcement of President Howard Elliott. "By the end of 1910 the main line between the head of the lakes, the Twin Cities, Puget sound and Portland will be laid entirely with steel of either 85 or 90 pounds weight to the yard, and thus we shall complete the work of replacing the heavier rails begun in 1904. Elimination of all small wooden structures in the main line will also continue as rapidly as it can be done without interruption to the movement of business. All important bridges are now of steel.

"Quite a number of pieces of double track are being put in on the main line, some between St. Cloud and Staples, Minn., and some small pieces between Jamestown and Bloom, N. D. Between Huntley and Billings, Mont.; between Logan and Bozeman, Mont.; between Missoula and De Smet, Mont.; between Spokane and Trent, Wash."

"Double track is already completed between Seattle and Tacoma, and work is now going on making double track between Tenino, Wash., and the Columbia river bridge. Construction will shortly be begun also on the new double track line of the company between Tacoma and Tenino, which, when finished, will give the company a complete double track line between Seattle and Portland.

"When these pieces of work are completed the company will have double track, or the equivalent thereof, between St. Paul and Spokane of nearly 700 miles.

"Between Spokane and Pasco is the equivalent of double track by reason of the construction of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle railway, which gives an alternate route with low grade and light curvature.

"In addition to strengthening the main line an outfit with heavy rails, metal bridges and a liberal supply of ballast, block signals, are being installed at various points where there is large train movement. The company feels that the growth of the northwest will be rapid during the next few years, has placed orders for considerable equipment for delivery in 1910."—Spokesman-Review.

DELTA Upsilon JUBILEE.

Boston, Nov. 3.—Delegates from the United States and Canada gathered here today for the celebration of the diamond jubilee of the Delta Upsilon fraternity. The climax of the convention will be the annual dinner Friday, at which it is expected Governor Hughes of New York and President Paunce of Brown university will speak.

OREGON TRUNK LINE TO RUN UP COLUMBIA

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 3.—The Oregon Trunk railway today filed articles of incorporation here. The capital is \$2,000,000, divided into 50,000 shares. The purpose of the corporation is to build a railroad from a point in Washington to the Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad across the Columbia river to Celilo, then up the Columbia to the Deschutes river and up that river, continuing in a southerly direction to Klamath Falls, Ore.

The new company is succeeded in interest by the Nevada company of the same name, which is now building a railroad up the Deschutes into central Oregon. The Oregon Trunk is the line which is said to have financial backing of J. J. Hill and which carried on a sensational contest for vantage points in the Deschutes canyon some weeks ago with the Deschutes railroad, a Harriman subsidiary.

Articles of incorporation of the Day Produce company were filed yesterday with the county clerk and recorder. The capital stock is \$15,000 and the directors are W. W. Berry of Missoula, R. T. Dilworth of Spokane and F. J. Day of Wallace.
