PROHIBITIONISTS ARE ENCOURAGED

Chicago, Nov. 3.—Charles R. Jones, chairman of the national committee of the prohibition party, sees encouragement for prohibition in the election returns, despite the defeat of reform forces in many cities.

"The most important feature of the elections," said Chairman Jones tonight, "was the startling defeat of the reform forces in Buffalo, Cincinnati and San Francisco. These defeats are in no case a result of indifference to political reform and civic righteousness in the large cities. In almost every case there was evident a strong public sentiment for the election of clean men to office and the wiping out of graft."

"At the same time, however, the liquor interests and their allied forces of graft and vice, put on their guard by rising public sentiment against them, have been strengthening their already compact political power and through one or the other of the dominant political organizations, have easily won a temporary reprieve from the doom marked for them by public opinion."

"The triumph of the liquor forces in Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Louisville and San Francisco prove undeniably that the only way to drive out the corrupt elements and break up their grip on public affairs is by the union of all the forces of good citizenship in a permanent political organization."

Growth Indicated. New York, Nov. 3.—Growth of prohibition sentiment in up-state New York is indicated by available returns from towns which voted on local option yesterday.

The no-license districts so far recorded include 11 towns in Steuben county, 10 in Allegheny, six in Chautauque, six in Monroe, six in Saratoga, five in Erie, three in Niagara, three in Cattaraugus and two in Genesee.

HONDURAS AIDS ZELAYA. Washington, Nov. 2.—Persistent rumors are reaching the state department that the government of Honduras is giving active support to President Zelaya in Nicaragua in his contest against the insurrectionary army of General Estrada.

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
