

NEW MAP OF VALLEY IS FINISHED

HAMILTON ENGINEER PREPARES AN ELABORATE SKETCH OF THE BITTER ROOT.

Hamilton, Nov. 7.—O. J. Jenkins, a well-known civil engineer of Hamilton, who has charge of the engineering work on the new sewer system that is being put in here, has just completed a new map of the Bitter Root valley. It shows the valley in both Missoula and Ravalli counties.

The map is complete in every detail. It shows all of the towns of the two counties, including Darby, Combs, Ward, Grantsdale, Hamilton, Riverside, Corvallis, Woodside, Victor, Stevensville, Bitter Root and Florence in Ravalli county, and Carlton, Lolo and Missoula in Missoula county. In addition to the towns being shown on the map, all of their platted townsites are shown. All of the irrigation projects are shown, including the big project of the Bitter Root Valley Irrigation company, as well as all of the smaller ones.

All trails, rivers, creeks, ditches, reservoirs and irrigated tracts are enumerated, and the different ones are brought out by using colors. The main body of the map is black and white, with an intermingling of red, green and yellow. The map is about 4x8 feet.

The map is destined to be one of the big advertisements that will be sent forth from the valley. It is the intention of Mr. Hawkins to put out 20,000 of them in pocket form. This pocket edition will be out in a short time, if all goes well, and with the help of all interested in the boosting of the valley, it will be accomplished. Business, houses, real estate men, professional men, booster organizations and irrigation companies will lend their support to the publication of the pocket edition.

It is expected that this pocket edition will be distributed on the railroads leading toward the valley, and they will also be used extensively by all who have correspondence with those living in other states, who are inquiring about the valley.

RELIGION'S MISSION IS SUBJECT

REV. W. H. BAGBY PREACHES INTERESTING SERMON AT THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH.

"The Mission of Religion" was the subject of an interesting sermon preached at the Christian church yesterday morning by Rev. W. H. Bagby. In part he said:

"According to an ancient theory, the world was launched as a vessel with a distant definite destination. In view, but was wrecked on the rock of sin before it had cleared the home harbor. The original plan, having been abandoned and a force organized to rescue the passengers on the ill-fated vessel, before she should finally sink to the bottom of the sea, she was meant to sail. According to a newer, saner and more scriptural theory, the world was launched as a strong ship with a distant, definite destination in view, but right in the beginning, encountered the opposing forces that are as beneficent as, under the law of compensation, they are inevitable. As a result of this encounter the ship suffered a shock, but was neither totally wrecked nor hopelessly crippled. Divine wisdom had planned her voyage, and infinite power was back of it. The beneficent result of the encounter with the opposing forces, was the bringing into play of the reserve power provided for this very purpose, and made subject to the call of need. First forms never exhibit the best of which they are capable. Strength and beauty are born of struggle. If there were no resistance there could be no struggle. It is a beneficent thing that all currents set strongly in the opposite direction to that in which the Creator meant the world should move. But an opposing force is a blessing only as it is overcome. To that which it overcomes it becomes a curse. Hence the apostle admonishes, 'Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good.' At Long Beach, California, is the skeleton of a great whale which was stranded alive on the beach by overcoming the tides and waves the great fish had gained the strength that could have sunk a ship; by being overcome by them it was reduced to helplessness and death. So man, by overcoming evil tendencies, gains moral strength; but by yielding to them, lose all and become moral wrecks.

Religion is the force whose office is to enable men to triumph over evil tendencies and powers. Evil tendencies are not sin. Yielding to evil tendencies is sin. Christ came to destroy sin, not by destroying the forces that set in that direction, but by putting the courage and the strength in men to stand before them and to advance over them. A moral victory is sometimes gained by being able to hold one's own against the tide that sets in the opposite direction. Two boats were racing up the Atlantic coast. One of the captains, noticing the landmarks on the shore, discovered that both the vessels were drifting backward instead of moving forward, the current being stronger than the wind. Secretly dropping an anchor, he won the race by standing still. In the past the church has triumphed over the forces that swept down upon her, by simply holding her own against them. Many an individual Christian has done the same thing. Many a time, when fishing in these swift Montana streams, have I realized that I was doing well when able only to stand. God does not praise the man who stands when he could advance; but He does praise the man who stands when he can do nothing more.

"St. Paul says: 'Where sin abounded grace did much more abound,' then asks, 'Shall we sin that grace may abound?' His emphatic negative to his own question is based upon the fact that deliberate sin arouses divine indignation and does not appeal to divine compassion. The sin that had caused grace to abound, was the sin of ignorance. It was, the sight of men struggling in darkness and weakness against the forces of evil that moved God to send the needed help, even at a great cost, as the sacrifice of his only Son. The enlightened Christian must overcome the temptation to sin that grace may abound. Jesus himself counted on the aiding grace of God only as He was found struggling against the tides of evil. He steadfastly refused to try God by yielding in the slightest degree to even the sorest and strongest temptation. As the resisting powers of the deep sea demons are developed under the pressure of the lower depths, so the many virtues of the Son of God came out under the stress and strain of the world. As was the strain so was His strength, and His strength because of the strain not yielded to, but overcome.

If the world shall ever reach the goal of its divinely appointed destiny it will be by the help of the heart and the hope put into it by the religion of Christ, the pre-eminence of which among religions, as the pre-eminence of its author among men, is universally conceded. As Luther Burbank is working among his flowers and fruits, aiding them in their struggle toward perfection, so the spirit of God is in the world aiding it in its struggle toward the high goal of the divinely appointed destiny of its molecules, so the world is being transformed of men. Let no man hat in dismay in the presence of his powerful impulses to sin. In the strength of the natural man is the promise and the possibility of a vigorous spiritual manhood. Every soul of Tarbis is potentially a Paul the Apostle. There was never a strong spiritual character who did not owe his strength in a large measure to a life-long struggle with a robust natural man. A robust natural man is a challenge to a combat that will issue in honor to the victor. If you are a man of strong passions, down them, and you will get strength out of the exercise and glory out of the victory.
