COMMISSIONERS TAKE DECIDED STAND

SHERIFF ORDERED TO REMOVE
FEMALE PRISONERS TO THE
PROPER DEPARTMENT.

The county commissioners took a pronounced stand yesterday in favor of the contention of Police Magistrate Small regarding the placing of female prisoners in the men's department at the county jail, by instructing the county clerk to notify the sheriff to at once remove the women now confined in the men's part of the jail to their proper place in the department originally intended for them. The sheriff is also to be ordered, in no case hereafter, to allow women to be confined in the men's department. The police judge had maintained that the women sentenced to the county jail should not be placed with the male prisoners, as such a procedure is against the law. William Oliver, the contractor for the new courthouse under construction, was granted permission by the county commissioners to make a couple of changes in the materials to enter into the building. The original plans of the structure called for the use of terrazzo in the floors of the lobby, but the contractor was permitted to make use of tile for that purpose. He was also allowed to use Italian marble in place of Tennessee marble for the wainscoting. In the original contract, the commissioners were given the right to make these changes if they saw fit. The new materials will make an added cost of \$3,475. The saloon license of Burr Bros. was renewed by the board, and a license was granted J. W. Davis to conduct a saloon at the old Met Staris place on the Big Blackfoot river.

MAIL ROBBERS SENTENCED.

St. Louis, Nov. 9.—Three men who, postoffice inspectors declare, are members of a band of robbers, that has stolen large sums in Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and surrounding states, pleaded guilty today to robbing the Wellsville, Mo., postoffice and were sentenced to terms in prison.

PRESBYTERIAN LADIES DINE THE MEN

OVER EIGHTY GUESTS TENDERED
A BANQUET IN AUDITORIUM
OF LOCAL CHURCH.

What was perhaps one of the most enjoyable events in church circles in Missoula for some time was the dinner tendered the men of the Presbyterian church last night in the church auditorium by the ladies of the congregation. The table was loaded with good things to eat and 80 gentlemen were served by the ladies, who, to say the least, increased their popularity to an infinite extent. Perhaps the ladies went on the principle that "the easiest way to a man's heart is through his stomach."

The meeting opened with the singing of the Doxology, after which grace was said by Rev. T. A. Wickes, who acted as toastmaster. After grace, Mr. Wickes made a few remarks and was followed by Professor J. Franklin Thomas, who rendered a vocal selection in such a manner as to compel an encore.

An informal talk on "As It Strikes an Old-Timer" by Mr. Kennett, was interesting and instructive. Mr. Kennett spoke of the history of the local Presbyterian church from the time of its establishment until the present, dwelling on the first humble house of worship and leading up to the time of the construction of the present edifice.

Albert Besancon, an attorney, who but recently located in Missoula, told "How the Church Strikes the Stranger Within Our Gates." His address created a favorable impression. Like Mr. Kennett, he spoke of the Presbyterian church, but his talk was along another line, none the less interesting. It was exceedingly well received. W. W. Wickes pleased everyone with a vocal solo so well that it was necessary for him to sing an encore. He was followed by Dr. J. J. Buckley, who spoke on "The Citizen and the Church." Dr. Buckley is a delightful speaker and from the very beginning held his audience in spell. He spoke to the point, telling of the needs of the church in every community, how it should be supported by every true-hearted citizen, and how no man should sign a subscription if he has no intention of abiding by his promise. Rev. J. N. Maclean, pastor of the church, made a few remarks, complimenting the ladies on their dinner, and then Robert Newman, head of the Sunday School union of the state, made a neat little talk in giving a vote of thanks to the ladies for their delightful and charming dinner, after which the whole company sang the national anthem and dispersed.
