STORM DOES MUCH DAMAGE

WIND AND FLOOD WORK HAVOC IN JAMAICA—ALL COMMUNICATION IS CUT OFF.

Kingston, Jamaica, Nov. 10.—All the land lines are down as the result of a storm that has swept this section. Communication with neighboring islands is impossible. Floods followed the windstorm and continue unabated.

No Details.

Santiago, Cuba, Nov. 10.—No details of damage done by the storm that swept over the island of Jamaica have reached here. While cable communication between Santiago and Holland Bay, Jamaica, has not been interrupted, the latter place is not in touch with Kingston because the government telegraph lines are down. It is believed that Kingston and vicinity suffered more than any other part of the island, but the extent of the damage cannot be ascertained. Jamaica has been cut off from the outside world for nearly five days as the result of a hurricane that began there Saturday night. Owing to the unusual interruption it is feared here that great damage has been done. Jamaica is in no condition to stand another disaster. Upon the crops, which were ripening, depends the future standing of the islands, which was swept by a hurricane four years ago and suffered a serious earthquake and fire in 1907. All efforts to restore cable connections have failed.

Another Storm Threatens.

Colon, Nov. 10.—Communication between this place and the Bull's Bay cable station, Jamaica, was re-established for a short time Monday afternoon, but was lost again and there has been no word from that point since. Whether this indicates a new disturbance of some kind is not known. It may be that the new connections were not sufficiently complete to last. The sea here is high and another storm from the north threatens. It is reported here tonight that Porto Rico and other West Indian islands besides Jamaica had been cut off, which would seem to indicate that another earthquake had occurred in Jamaica.

PUZZLING QUESTION IN CASE OF EVERTON

Somerville, N. J., Nov. 10.—An interesting legal question is a sequel today of the autopsy performed last night on the body of Robert Simpson, the hypnotic subject, whom Arthur Everton, a hypnotist, failed to restore after placing him in a trance. The autopsy disclosed that Simpson's death was due to rupture of the aorta. Just to what measure of responsibility, if any, Everton will finally be held by the law is a question which is puzzling the legal experts. The prosecutor of this district is credited with the intention to hold Everton on a technical charge of manslaughter until his case can be passed upon by the grand jury next month.

The autopsy last night was delayed until a professional hypnotist had had opportunity to make one last effort to restore animation in Simpson's body. There was not the slightest response and the examination indicated to the physicians that death had resulted immediately after the collapse of the subject from the rigid state in which the hypnotist had placed him. Arthur Everton, the hypnotist, it was said by the authorities, here would be held to await the action of the December grand jury, and would be admitted to bail.

PARKS FINED \$4,000.

New York, Nov. 10.—John A. Parks, author of a pooling plan and commission, under which the Manila and Fiber Paper Manufacturers' association was operated, and who was indicted last July by the federal grand jury for violation of the anti-trust laws, surrendered to the authorities today and pleaded guilty in the United States district court. Judge Hough fined Parks \$4,000.

ABYSSINIA TRANQUIL.

London, Nov. 10.—An official dispatch received today from Addis Ababa, the capital of Abyssinia, states that the country is tranquil and the condition of King Menelik continues to improve. The story circulated here yesterday that there had been a battle between the forces of rival princes is apparently an exaggerated version of the conflict that took place at Tigre. In this fight Chief Abraha was defeated. It is said, and brought a prisoner to the capital.

CHINESE TONG WAR'S THIRD VICTIM

OW YANG GUN SHOT DOWN IN PRESENCE OF SAN FRANCISCO POLICEMAN.

San Francisco, Nov. 10.—The Tong war, growing out of theelopment several days ago of the Gue, wife of an On Yick Tong man, with a member of the Yee family, claimed its third victim tonight, when Ow Yang Gun of the On Yick Tong, and a cousin of the acting Chinese consul, was shot and killed as he was leaving the headquarters of his Tong. Yee Yuen, said by the police to be one of the san men of the Yees, was arrested.

Five men, said to be of the Yee family, lay in wait for Ow Yang Gun. When he was within 10 feet of them, although a policeman was standing in the narrow street but a few yards away, one of the men fired point blank at the On Yick Tong man, killing him instantly.

The murder of a Chinese at Mountain View tonight also is believed to be connected with the present Tong war. Two members of the Yee family were killed recently by the On Yicks, and it is asserted by the police that at a meeting of the Yees early this week it was voted to take triple toll for their dead. The police fear that the war will spread throughout other coast cities.

All efforts of the Chinese "Six companies" and of the Chinese consul to patch up peace have been of no avail. A large force of police has been rushed to Chinatown.

CANADIAN INDUSTRIAL POLICY CONDEMNED

FRATERNAL DELEGATE FROM A. F. OF L. REPORTS ON MOVE-MENT ACROSS BORDER.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 10.—"This factional plague," was the term applied today by Jerome Jones of Atlanta, Ga., to the Canadian movement known as the Canadian Federation of Labor in his report to the convention of the American Federation of Labor. Mr. Jones was fraternal delegate of the federation to the Canadian Trades congress convention at Quebec last September.

"This national movement of Canada for Canadians," said Mr. Jones, "is as odious to the Canadian Trades congress as the nomination or open-shop policy is to the men and women who labor in the states."

The day's proceedings were enlivened by an address on woman's suffrage by Mrs. Frances Squire Potter, a former professor in the University of Minnesota. Several resolutions were received but not read, one of them, introduced by President F. J. McArdle of the Amalgamated Association of Iron Steel and Tin Workers, declaring conditions in the United States Steel corporation to be the worst with which organized labor has to contend and recommending that means be devised for making more effective the strikers of affiliated organizations now pending.

CAPITALIST OFFERS GOLD FOR NEW NAME

Spokane, Nov. 10.—One hundred dollars in gold is offered by F. Lewis Clark, a retired capitalist of Spokane, railroad builder and contender in the Sander-class yachting races on the Atlantic ocean, for a substitute title to be adopted by the National Dry Farming congress, which will have its fifth sessions in Spokane early next fall. His object is to secure a name which will be more appropriate than the present one. Many officers and members of the organization believe that it gives the wrong impression of the aims and purposes of the congress, in that the title, dry farming, is a misnomer. There are no strings to Mr. Clark's offer and it is open to the world, and its adoption by the congress decides the winner. An attempt to change the name of the organization at Billings, Mont., last month resulted in a clash and the title remained, as formerly. Such titles as modern and scientific were offered as substitutes, but were rejected because of the opposition.

BELMONT SENTENCED.

San Francisco, Nov. 10.—David Belmont, convicted of having raised a United States note from \$1 to \$10, was sentenced today by Judge Dehaven of the United States district court to serve four years in Folsom prison. Belmont was captured at Reno, Nev., where he made a sensational escape from a deputy United States marshal, but was recaptured after a fight.

EXPORTS SHOW INCREASE.

Washington, Nov. 10.—An increase of more than \$21,000,000 in the value of the exports of domestic products from the United States is shown for the month of October, last, as compared with a like period last year, the respective totals being \$2,543,720, against \$191,782,048, as revealed in a statement issued today by the bureau of statistics.

MANY RABBIS ATTEND.

New York, Nov. 10.—One hundred and four rabbis attended today's meeting of the central conference of the American rabbis at the Temple Emanuel. Dr. Julian Morgenstern, reading the report of the committee, declared the outlook for the year was anything but reassuring.

Fan Diego, Cal., Nov. 10.—Mrs. P. S. Grant, wife of a son of the late president Grant, died today of apoplexy. She had been an invalid for years.

METHODISTS AT ALBANY.

Albany, N. Y., Nov. 10.—With distinguished Methodist clergymen and laymen from all parts of the world in attendance, including about 25 bishops, the annual conference of the general committee of foreign mission of the Methodist Episcopal church was opened here today. The conference will continue until Monday. The delegates will call on Governor Hughes at the executive chamber tomorrow noon. A missionary mass meeting has been arranged for tomorrow evening. The conference is to apportion more than \$1,000,000 for missionary work.

SUFFRAGETTES SENTENCED.

London, Nov. 10.—Alice Paul and Amelia Brown, the window-smashing suffragettes, were today sentenced each to one month at hard labor.

During the banquet at Guild hall, in honor of the king's birthday, last night stones were thrown through the window of the banquet hall, the crash of glass interrupting the speech of the lord mayor. The affair proved to be a suffragette demonstration and two offenders were arrested.

MACVEAGH'S COMING REPORT.

Washington, Nov. 10.—The central bank question will not figure in the annual report of the secretary of the treasury, the New York custom house system will be dealt with exhaustively and there is no intimation of reducing the size of currency paper. Secretary MacVeagh made these points clear in an interview today.
