

Town Lots to Be Sold on Flathead

BIRD'S-EYE VIEW OF RAVALLI.

On Tuesday next, November 16, the towns of Arlee, Ravalli, Dixon, St. Ignatius and Roman will begin their official existence and their march towards prosperity. On that day the government will offer for sale the lots comprised in the official townsites of these five towns, the sale being conducted from the Missoula land office. The provision for this sale was made when the reservation was first opened. Seven townsites were set aside—Polson and Dayton have already been opened—and it was provided that the lots should be sold by auction to the highest bidder. Under the provisions of the act governing this sale those people who have already improved upon lots comprised in the townsites may prove up on their property on November 15 and buy them at the price set upon them by the government appraisers. Unless the property is thus proved upon, however, the lots will be placed on sale in the same manner as the rest of the townsite and will go to the highest bidder.

Through three of these towns, Arlee, Ravalli and Dixon, the Northern Pacific railroad runs. The other two are on the stage line from Ravalli and within easy distance of the railroad.

In addition there is some of the most promising land in the whole reservation. From an agricultural standpoint they are of course, practically valueless, but commercially they are destined to be more than valuable. The rapid influx of people after next spring and the growth of population following the opening is bound to make these towns commercial centers. Five years will see the reservation filled with people. Every acre will be turned into farm land and the presence of a country of such fertility filled with farms and sending out products of the field and of the pasture can mean nothing but growth to the towns which command the situation. At present none of the towns are large and the opportunity to the buyer will be a great one.

Arlee, the town which is closest to Missoula has been noted principally in the past for the fact that it was the station for helper engines on the Northern Pacific. It lost that distinction recently, however, and at present it is nearly deserted. It is located in the midst of one of the richest portions of the reservation, however. It is situated just 10 miles from the agency and is one of the headquarter towns of the Indian reservation.

Ravalli is the largest town of the lot. This town is the headquarters of the Flathead stage line and is the door to the whole southern end of the reservation. It has acquired national prominence during the past year owing to the fact that the buffalo herd was shipped from there to Canada. The town is located 27 miles from Missoula, and the fact that it commands the whole reservation makes its prospects unusually bright.

Dixon is another town which is at present on the boom. It is located at the point where the head of Oreille river strikes the railroad in one of the most beautiful spots on the reservation. At present it is the headquarters for a large number of rail-

road men, owing to the fact that it is the point where the helper engines are put on over the Evaro hill.

St. Ignatius is known all over the state, and for that matter all over the country. Here in this beautiful valley the Jesuit Fathers built their mission and began their work of conversion among the red men. This quiet little town has been the scene of many a stirring incident. It was just as large and just as far progressed as it is now years before the rest of the state had even begun to grow. The mission buildings and the Catholic schools are located there now and the town will continue to be the religious headquarters of the valley.

Roman is situated fairly in the heart of the reservation. It is just half way between Ravalli and Polson and is in the shadow of the most beautiful portions of the Mission mountains, the beautiful group of peaks which are banked on either side by Mount McDonald and St. Mary's peak.

This whole section of the reservation will soon be opened in earnest. The Great Northern and the Puget Sound have parties in the reservation at present surveying for a line from Kallispell and the towns of the north, down into the Missoula river valley, and soon the land which has until yesterday resounded with the war-whoops of the Indian, will be heard the strident whistle of the locomotive and the broad plains which have known as yet nothing but the hoof of the Indian pony will be spanned by the steel roadway of the iron horse. The town-let sale for these reasons offers an unrivalled opportunity for the man with small capital who wishes to make his fortune in the new west. The lots will soon be at a premium and the little towns will, within a few years, offer much to the investor and capitalist.

POLSON PEOPLE ASK FOR INCORPORATION

Polson, Mont., Nov. 11.—Polson is one of the best examples of the way in which the Flathead towns are going to grow when the new population begins to come in. This little town, located on the shores of Flathead lake, has made some wonderful strides during the past three months. The town has already all manner of industries started and a petition was made to the county commissioner this week asking that the necessary action be taken to incorporate the town. A census taker, J. J. Fitzpatrick, was appointed by the board to find out the population and as soon as this is done the articles of incorporation will be drawn up.

TO TEST MEDIUM'S POWER.

New York, Nov. 11.—The names of some of the scientists who will participate in the seances of Mme. Kasapla Palladino, the noted spiritualistic medium, who reached here yesterday from Europe, were made known today. The scientists will test the genuineness of Mme. Palladino's manifestations of the committee, including Professor William James, Dr. D. Stanley Hall of Clark university; Professor Hugo Munsterberg of Harvard university; Dr. Norton Prince and Dr. Charles A. Dana of this city.

INSANITY PLEA FAILED.

Seattle, Nov. 11.—Arthur George, who shot and killed his divorced wife at Brighton Beach on May 13, was convicted of murder in the first degree today and will be sentenced to death. The case attracted attention because it was the first in which a new state law that limits the use of the insanity plea was applied. After George's insanity defense had been held to be untenable the prosecuting attorney offered to accept a second degree verdict, but George refused and set up a plea of self defense.

FOR CHILDLIKE MINDS WAS THE TALE OF EDEN

Lawrence, Kan., Nov. 11.—The prophets Isaiah, Ezekiel and Jeremiah were classed as muckrakers and many stories of the old Testament were termed myths by Dr. Charles Foster Kent of the Yale Divinity school in a lecture before the students of the University of Kansas here yesterday.

"The prophets of Israel were the social reformers of their time," he said. "They were muckrakers, to use the present day term. They were sensational in their methods, notably Isaiah, Ezekiel and Jeremiah."

While Professor Kent believes that many of the stories in the Old Testament are myths, he sees good in them. He says the prophets were teaching a simple people and were forced to use extraordinary means to drive home their points.

In discussing the story of the Garden of Eden the speaker said he believed it to be a legend that served a good purpose, being well fitted to the childlike minds of the people to whom it was first related.

MAN'S DESCENT AT LAST ESTABLISHED

Ashtabula, Ohio, Nov. 11.—Prehistoric burying grounds, which may rival the famous Great Serpent mound near Cincinnati, were discovered yesterday at Point Parkhall, near here, when workmen unearthed the complete skeleton of a primate man. The skeleton, according to Dr. F. D. Snyder, a scientist and member of the International Geographic society, shows market deviations from that of the present day human being.

The femur is curved like that of the ape, the tibia is flat at the joint, and the humerus has a perforation no longer found. The skull slopes back and the lower jaw protrudes.
