## CAUGHT ON THE RUN ABOUT TOWN

The arrangements committee of Carpenters' union No. 25 went to bed last night well satisfied that there had been nothing THE NIGHT left undone that could contribute to the success of the annual ball of the union at the Elite hall tonight. "Come around," said Chairman Trump of the committee, "and you will see that the wood butchers are not dead ones. The dance will be the best we know how to give; the boys have been hustling plenty and they are on the job to make it go right. We want all of our friends to come, for we know they will have a good time if they do, and we know, too, that they will regret it if they don't come. The program will be one that will please all dancers, and the ball will show that our fellows are as smooth as men should be who push planes and as level as their calling makes them." The carpenters have a reputation as entertainers, and they propose this year to add to the laurels they have won upon previous occasions of this sort.

## Charles E. Redeker, real estate dealer at Polson and secretary of the chamber of commerce of the lively new town at the foot of the lake, is in the city from the reservation and is staying at the Shapard. Mr. Redeker came down to attend the auction sale of town lots at the land office today, and while he is here he would like to have anybody and everybody talk to him who wants to learn something about the reservation and the region around the lake. "Polson is growing fast," said Mr. Redeker to a Missoulian man last night. "We are not booming, but we are boosting our town and our district all we can. There is a good deal of activity in our real estate, and there is good reason for it. Lots are selling in the business district for the sums that were paid for them when the government sold them at auction. We have more than 600 people in Polson now, and we are certain that there will be 2,000 by the middle of summer. Our \$30,000 electric light plant is in operation now; we will soon have a fine water supply, pumped from a crib 1,500 feet out in the lake; there is a handsome Methodist church, nearing completion, and it is practically ready for— we raised \$1,100 on the spot when the corner stone was laid; we shall soon have telephone connections with Missoula—there are miles of copper wire on the ground to connect Kallsdell with the Bell system in Missoula. These are some of the things we are getting and there are more that we are after; we want an electric railway to Missoula and we want a whole lot of things that we are planning to get. You will be surprised to see the town that we are making."

Last night the bridge contractors threw open the west footway of the big FOOTWAY IS OPEN bridge, and today this all who wish to cross on the new structure; when it became known that the walk was open there were many people who took the trip last night across the new bridge just for the novelty of it; there was not one of them who was not pleased with the work. There remains little work to be done on the approaches to the walk to make this route altogether pleasant, but this will be done today. Contractor Burrill said last night that the cold weather had delayed some of the work or the walk would have been opened Sunday morning. He asked that a request be published to those who use the footwalk that they keep moving when they cross the bridge and not loiter and block the way, as it will inconvenience the workmen and make it disagreeable for those who wish to go across. The paving of the roadway is progressing in good shape, and with favorable weather will be finished this week. On the approaches the city has some work to do yet, but not much.

Engineers Andy Dittelmeyer and Sam Wilson came in yesterday from St. Regis, bringing a handsome bear skin, which they declare is the result of their hunting skill. It is a splendid specimen, all right, but unfortunately the engineers forgot to bring two Eskimos to prove their assertion as to the killing of the bear that used to wear the skin. They have only their own affidavits, and Bill Delantey has taken advantage of the situation to make a counter affidavit to the effect that the bear was in a hollow log, sleeping for all winter, when the hunters found him; they prodded the bear with a pole and he crawled out; when he saw what he was up against the bear died of heart failure just as the two engineers fainted away. When they recovered they found the bear dead and skinned it. Delantey says he will lead an expedition to the spot where they left the carcass and will conduct an autopsy to prove that the bear was not shot, but that it died of heart failure, provided he can get anybody to go with him.

CARLISLE'S CONDITION WORSE. New York, Nov. 15.—There was a change for the worse today in the condition of former Secretary of the Treasury John G. Carlisle, who is under treatment for intestinal disorders at St. Vincent hospital. The attending physician said tonight that his condition "had assumed a more serious aspect." He declined to make any further statement.

## NEW ORGANIZATION IS FORMED

### WESTERN MONTANA POULTRY AND PET STOCK ASSOCIATION MAKES ITS DEBUT.

With the adoption of a constitution and the election of permanent officers, the Western Montana Poultry and Pet Stock association made its official debut into the ranks of organizations of the state for the betterment of conditions last evening, and from now on the efforts of the members will be devoted to the soliciting of new members and in living up to the rules of the organization.

The meeting was held in the character of a commerce room, but owing to the cold weather there was not as large an attendance as was desired, although a number of letters were read from people who are interested in the work and wish to become members. Some of these letters were from residents of Hamilton and the Bitter Root valley.

After the adoption of the constitution permanent officers were elected as follows: Leon B. Mayer, president; Mrs. McMillan, vice president; M. A. Cronwell, secretary-treasurer. These officers will form the makeup of the executive board.

Among the pieces of business to come up was the matter of holding a poultry and pet stock show in Missoula in Missoula in January. It was decided to hold the show and to invite associations from other parts of the state to participate. By asking other organizations to share in the show it is thought that an exchange of poultry and pet stock may be obtained which will prove of benefit to everyone concerned. As now planned, the fair will be held for three or four days, long enough for all interested to see the exhibits. Appropriate prizes will be given and nothing will be left undone to make this show one that will be remembered.

The constitution as adopted is as follows: The name of the association shall be the Western Montana Poultry and Pet Stock association.

The object shall be to promote the poultry and pet stock industry and perfect the same. In pursuance of this object every means shall be used to eliminate fraud in selling or buying poultry and eggs, either for domestic or breeding purposes, and every effort shall be made to prosecute for stealing poultry and pet stock from the members, bribery in shows and so forth.

Membership in the association shall be composed of either men or women who are interested in the promotion of its objects. The fee for membership shall be \$1 per year and \$5 for life membership. Members can be expelled for conduct unbecoming a member or violation of the A. P. A. rules.

The officers of the association shall be a president, vice president, secretary-treasurer, and an executive board, of which the foregoing officers shall be members. The term of office shall be one year.

Meetings shall be held in Missoula, Mont., unless otherwise provided, on the call of the secretary, who shall notify each member of a coming meeting at least six days before the meeting.
