CAUGHT ON THE RUN ABOUT TOWN

The big illuminated sign in front of the office of the Missoula Light & Water company has been equipped with a **SUCH A BLINKER** flasher that keeps the words on the sign in such a lively state of transformation that it stops everybody who passes after dark. First you read something and then you read something else; then you read the whole thing all together and then, when you are looking at the ensemble, the whole thing goes out and you are gazing at the dark night atmosphere. If the blinker blinked any more than it does, it would double the crowd that watches the changes and that would block the street, so it is well that the flasher doesn't flash any more than it does. It is a mighty good sight, anyway, and it has been blinking to good audiences all the week; the purpose of these signs, of course, is publicity and this one fulfills its mission admirably.

In front of the new furniture store of the Missoula Mercantile company, in the Chaney block, there has been erected another big electric sign that is now doing its work for the first time. This is the second big one to be placed on the Chaney block, the other being that of the Florence Laundry. The two add vastly to the liveliness of East Front street at night and that thoroughfare is coming into competition with some of the other cross streets as a business thoroughfare. It is said that there is another electric sign coming up that will completely disconcert anything there is now in the city in point of size. The electric light people are not willing to tell what it is or where it will be, but they admit that it will be the biggest thing in town and that it will be seen for a long distance, so high up will it be and so large as to its letters. It is expected that this big one will be here before long and it will probably be flashing in a few weeks, though there is no accurate information on this point.

At present, the highest-up sign in the city is that of the Savoy hotel, which blazes forth its letters from the top of the five-story structure which the hotel occupies. This sign is visible all over town and for a time it attracted special attention and was the occasion of many a suspicion that a fire had broken out, especially when it was viewed from one side. The result of this lofty display of lights is that a man at the railway station can see the hotel's announcement when he gets off the train. Unless it is in Butte, there is no higher sign in the state than this one, but everything is high in the big mining city and it is likely that there is a sign there that tops this one.

The first electric sign in Missoula was the one on the Shapard hotel, which flashed first one side and then the other. There were others which followed rapidly. The Missoulian office being among the pioneers. Higgins avenue naturally had the greater number in a short time, but the cross streets have been keeping up their end in good shape lately. The drug stores were early in the game and the night cafes had their lighted letters shining amongst the first. It is getting to be almost an everyday matter to see an electric sign hoisted and they do not seem as much of a novelty as they did a few years ago. To those of us who see them every night the number in the city does not seem so great, but it is a common comment amongst visitors in the city that Missoula has more of these signs than any other city of its size in the west. It is a good advertisement for the town.
