RICHARD WATSON GILDER DIES UNEXPECTEDLY FROM ILLNESS OF SHORT TIME.

New York, Nov. 18.—The strong tone of stocks today was not accompanied by animation in the speculation. The most striking incident of the day's news was the announcement of the "melon cutting" by the Wells Fargo Express company.

"Experimental Evolution" was the subject of a highly instructive talk given by the members of the university science association last night by Professor J. E. Kirkwood, head of the forestry course in the state university.

The woman declares she and Frick were wrestling over a glass of beer, when both pressed against the window frame, which gave way, precipitating them to the pavement.
