

BUTTE DISPARAGES TRUNK FRAUDS HAVE LOCAL TEAM WIDE RANGE

SPORTING EDITOR OF ANACONDA STANDARD DOPES OUT PECULIAR ARGUMENT.

The Missoula team has one victory already scored against the Toshtites by a goal from Field, and has defeated the miners, after the first tie game between the two teams. Bozeman has lost twice to the miners and once to the university and has no chance to get in with a championship claim.

The above, which is quoted from the Anacoda Standard, shows the general spirit that is prevalent in Butte against the University of Montana team. The writer of the above article has taken the standpoint, that if the unexpected should happen and Bozeman should defeat the varsity that the miners would be tied for the championship of the state with the local aggregation, owing to the fact that the percentage of games won and lost would be the same.

This appears, on the face of it, ridiculous and would not hold water for a minute with anyone acquainted with the facts. In the first part of the season, before Coach White's machine was running smoothly, the school of mines managed to play a game with the state university eleven, although outclassed and their goal in danger several times, whereas the varsity was never in any danger of being scored on. Butte has defeated Bozeman twice, once 6 to 0 and again 10 to 5. The university went to Bozeman in a crippled condition and defeated the agricultural college 2 to 0. The team then defeated the school of mines by the decisive score of 21 to 0, showing the Butte team up in every department of the game and leaving no doubt in the minds of either the spectators or the opposing players, but what they had met their superiors. Now the argument comes up that if Bozeman should defeat Missoula, the two teams, Butte and Missoula, would be tied for first place in the championship race. To place a team like the miners in the same class with the varsity does not seem like common sense and it is not believed that the supporters of the Bozeman team will be able to influence the general public by raising such a grandstand play as the foregoing.

The widow is Marie, daughter of John Potter of Philadelphia, who married Baron George in 1891. They have two sons. Baron George usually made his home in Paris and devoted himself chiefly to the promotion of financial institutions. He was born in 1861 and admitted to the bar in 1886. He was a commander of the Royal Order of the Savior, of Greece.

CONFERENCE AT WASHINGTON BRINGS OUT MAGNITUDE OF CUSTOM EVASION.

Washington, Nov. 22.—Institution of criminal prosecutions against perpetrators of "sleeper trunk" customs frauds, with ramifications in all parts of the country, the pressing of existing indictments to avoid lapse under the statute of limitations, and the customs investigation generally were discussed at a lengthy conference in the treasury department today.

Secretary of the Treasury MacVeagh, Attorney General Wickersham, Collector Loeb of the port of New York and United States District Attorney Henry A. Wise participated. Incidentally, Secretary MacVeagh announced that the \$2,000,000 which the American Sugar Refining company had paid over to the government on account of the evasion of duties was regarded by the government proposed to recover much more money as the result of frauds the so-called trust had committed.

The sleeper trunk frauds, whereby goods are brought into this country in trunks with false bottoms, stretch to many parts of the United States, though passing only through the port of New York, in cases about to be prosecuted. Beyond the generalization of millions of dollars, nobody can estimate the amount of taxes evaded. Violators of the law in this respect are mostly dressmakers. The government has much evidence and the prosecutions promise to be sensational.

Collector Loeb said today that the sleeper trunk frauds could no longer be carried on successfully under rules he has adopted. These provide for a new stamp arrangement for trunks, and a limit to the time a trunk may remain on the docks.

MARKET MOVEMENTS OF THE DAY

New York, Nov. 22.—The financial community was as little prepared today to make its final appraisal of the import to corporations of the decision of the Standard Oil company case as it was in the stock market session of Saturday after the unexpected announcement of the decision. The disturbed tone of the market and the market's lapse into dullness when measures of support became effective were significant of the importance attached to the decision of the case before going forward. It is in the uncertainty thus involved that the principal harm is feared, not only for the speculative position in stocks, but for business activity. It was for this reason that all commentaries were agreed on the importance of an early settlement of the appeal in the case.

The most hopeful view of the situation from the standpoint of corporate interests was drawn from an analogy with the case of the commodities clause of the Heyburn law. Dire harm was predicted from this provision in its early stages and during the progress of the litigation to test it, but in its final conditional affirmation by the supreme court, the speculative spirit drew actual encouragement and made it the basis for some sensational rises in prices, especially in the group of stocks immediately affected—the coals.

The first hour of today's stock market saw a contest vigorously waged between the conflicting elements in the speculation in which the balance was fairly turned in favor of the reactionists, in spite of the most determined efforts at support. During this period of the day's operations weight half of the day's total business was transacted.

It is evident, therefore, that the demands for stocks followed the price recoveries that followed the first hour with some hesitation. The buying, having achieved its purpose of checking the decline, diminished. The copper stocks suffered particularly from the assumption that the new decision would prevent the proposed consolidation of the principal copper producers. United States Steel and Union Pacific also reflected the special hearing which the decision was supposed to have on these companies. Reading was strong throughout and formed the rallying point for the opposition.

Bonds were easy. Total sales, (par value), \$3,262,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Sentiment in the corn pit was bullish throughout the entire session. The market closed firm with prices 1/2c to 3/4c above the previous close. Oats were dull and prices moved over a narrow range. At the close prices were a shade higher to 1/4c lower. In provisions pork displayed the greatest strength and at the close was a shade to 1/2c higher. BALLINGER WITHDRAWS MANY OREGON ACRES. Washington, Nov. 22.—Secretary Ballinger has withdrawn from all forms of disposition approximately 3,262 acres along the upper Des Chutes river, Oregon. This is a tributary of the waterway, in connection with which a charge has been made that, in granting rights of way to Hill and Harriman railroads through the Des Chutes canon, Secretary Ballinger has rendered impossible the construction of a power plant in the canon. Lands withdrawn, involving incidentally the question of water facilities, will be left for congressional action to determine the proper form of disposition.
