STATE MUST AID IN REFORESTING REPRESENTATIVE OF WEYERHAUSER EXPRESSES HIMSELF ON SUBJECT OF INTEREST. Spokane, Nov. 24.—"We believe that the only way in which the forests are likely to be replaced is for the state either to buy the lands from the lumber companies at a small price and replant the cut over areas or remit the taxes. It is a simple mathematical demonstration that it will not pay the lumber corporation to keep up tax payments and wait for a new crop of trees on cut-over lands. When the taxes are added and the value of the timber is computed, it is only a 2 per cent investment and business men are not looking for that kind."
