The street railway has its line marked out from the Pine street crossing of the Rattlesnake, through Madison, Cedar and Pattee streets to East Front and this morning there will be things doing in the grading on the north side of the river. The special steel that is necessary to connect the Third street track with the rails on the bridge is all that remains to be done on the south side of the river to complete the line as far south as the new car barns; this steel is on the road and will soon be here. The work on the north side of the river will be rushed as fast as possible and Superintendent Inch is certain that he will have wheels rolling by the first of February. The university loop will not be constructed until later.

THROUGH TODAY

There was lively work yesterday on the bridge pavement; the arrival of the asphalt that had been delayed in transit made it possible to renew the work and Superintendent Grove made things hum. If the work is good and the last of the wood blocks will be laid by noon today. Had it not been for the miscarriage or side-tracking of the asphalt which was needed to complete the work, Mr. Grove would have had the pavement finished by Thanksgiving, as he expected but he was not to blame for this delay. Now he is certain that he will have a completed bridge before December arrives. Then the commissioners will accept and the boosters will celebrate.

ELEVATOR IS GOING

The new elevator in the Florence hotel was given its first workout yesterday and it traveled up and down just as if it had been doing business regularly for weeks. The workout was preliminary and there will be an official test today, after which if everything is all right the fine new machine will be accepted by Mr. Chaney and will be in use as soon as the changes in the office of the hotel are made. It is a model elevator and will greatly improve the house.

The evening train was held until 5 o'clock to accommodate them and the entire party returned last night.
