## BUILD PHONE LINES IN BITTER ROOT

FOREST SERVICE MEN ARE DOING GREAT THINGS IN IMPROVING VALLEY.

Supervisor W. W. White of the Bitter Root national forest announced yesterday that in accordance with the policy of the forest service to make it as easy a matter as possible to administer the affairs of the forests, two new telephone lines have recently been constructed in the Bitter Root valley and its tributaries. The longest line has been erected by the rangers of the forest and extends from Stevensville to the ranger station on Ambrose creek, about 13 miles east of Stevensville. This line can be connected with the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company's line in the valley and is expected to assist materially in attending to the affairs of the forest.

The second line has been constructed to run from Darby a distance of six miles to the Lick creek ranger station. This line has no connection with the Bell telephone, but, like the other, is intended for the use of the forest service only. The use of telephones in the forest affairs is nowhere more in use than it is out of Darby. Sixty-five miles of lines branch out from that little city, extending in every direction and tapping all of the rough country in that region, and making it possible for forest rangers and guards to at once notify each other in case of fire anywhere in the vicinity.

Further improvements are under way in the country south of Darby. That service is building a trail from what is known as Jennings' camp, southeast of Darby, to the forks of the Bitter Root river, a distance of six miles. A bridge and ranger's cabin are also being erected near the Jennings' camp. The bridge is to be of timber, about 45 feet in length, and will have two piers. Other improvement work is contemplated.

The funeral of Dr. E. A. Crain, the Missoula physician who died in Butte last week, was held yesterday afternoon from the residence, 508 East Spruce street. Many friends of the deceased turned out to pay their last respects. Music was rendered by a quartet, and Rev. Walter Lennie-Smith, rector of the Episcopal church, officiated. The members of Hell Gate lodge No. 383, B. P. O. E. and the Royal Highlanders were present in large numbers. Interment was in the Missoula cemetery.

MEN ALLEGED TO HAVE ROBBED WINE HOUSE APPEAR BEFORE JUSTICE COURT.

Frank Schultz, the porter of the Los Angeles Wine house, and J. F. Miller, a restaurant man, who were arrested last Saturday night after an investigation by Officer Hood, who charged them with stealing a large quantity of cigars and high priced wines from the wine house, were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Small yesterday. The complaint against them charge them with grand larceny. Schultz had previously admitted that he stole the stuff, and pleaded a plea of guilty, the court holding him to await the action of the district court. His bonds of \$1,000 could not be furnished and he will await trial in the county jail. Miller, who is alleged to have conducted a "fence" for the stolen goods, pleaded not guilty. He was represented by an attorney. His bonds were fixed at \$200 and were furnished. The date for his preliminary hearing has not yet been set.
