Examiner's Notes. The work in the various offices was very well done and up-to-date. The clerk and recorder was somewhat behind owing to the unusually large amount of "recording" to be done by a rather limited force. Suggestions by this office as to help in accounting were made and are alluded to in order to call attention to the recommendations made. The public administrator should be furnished with a register as soon as practicable in order that full and complete records of all records administered by him may be made. Road and poor taxes, amounting in all to \$2,200, have not been accounted for by former Treasurer Lockwood. Jasper Evans stands charged with receipts aggregating \$400; H. B. Wayland, \$200; Tom J. White, \$400; H. S. Lord, \$400; Beady and Truly, \$400; England and Frazer, \$400. These accounts should be closed by Mr. Lockwood before his bond expires. In conclusion, I desire to say all records are exceptionally well kept. NEW TOLL LINE. Hamilton, Nov. 29.—The Rocky Mountain Belle Telephone company has a large force of men at work between Hamilton and Stevensville putting in a new toll line. They are also setting new poles and making other necessary improvements in the line. When this toll line is completed Missoula and Hamilton will be connected with two metallic copper circuits and one metallic phantom circuit, which will give these two cities excellent service. The telephone directory has been revised and has recently been placed in the hands of all the company's subscribers.

PLAY POSTPONED. Hamilton, Nov. 29.—The public performance of the comic opera "Mikado," which is being prepared under the auspices of the Catholic church and which was to be given December 1 and 2, has been postponed to a later date, which will be announced later. The reason for the postponement is the failure of the costumes to arrive for the rehearsals.
