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KNOX CREATES NEW DIVISION

SECRETARY OF STATE EXTENDS PLANS TO LOOK AFTER NEAR-EASTERN AFFAIRS.

Washington, Dec. 1.—To extend further his general plan of specialization in the commercial and political affairs of the world Secretary Knox has created a division of "near-eastern" affairs and has selected Evan E. Young of South Dakota, now American consul at Sioniki, as chief.

The new division will have to do with affairs in Turkey, Persia, the Balkans and other states in that part of Europe. This general plan is in accord with the policies of all the leading nations of Europe.

The consular service is to receive more attention than hitherto with a view to its increased efficiency. The secretary has appointed Wilbur J. Carr, chief clerk of the department of state, director of the consular service—a newly created office.

Charles F. Wilson, law clerk of the department of state, has been appointed assistant solicitor, and is succeeded by Henry L. Bryan, assistant law clerk of the department.

WALLACE NEWS. Wallace, Dec. 1.—The Snowstorm mine is now shipping a great quantity of ore every month to Coram, Cal. The smelter at that point started receiving the ore from the Mullan copper mine in November. As much as 6,000 tons a month will be sent to Coram.

Helena, Dec. 1.—(Special)—The federal court was convened today by Judge Hunt and a grand jury ordered drawn. The venire is made returnable December 7. There are 41 cases to be presented to the grand jury.

Judge Hunt has a large amount of work before him, there being 36 cases to be disposed of. There are 17 criminal and 18 civil actions to which the government is a party.

The trial calendar will be set December 29 and the trial of cases will begin early in January.

JAIL TERM AWAITS MRS. E. PANKHURST. New York, Dec. 1.—To a cheering crowd of suffragettes Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, the British suffragette leader, waved farewell today as she departed on the steamer Teutonic for England.

She declared she and other suffragettes, who also will pass 30 days in jail, "just would not eat the prison food, but would bring on a hunger strike."

RECENT STORM WRECKED LINCOLN ROCK STATION—LAMP STILL BURNS.

Portland, Ore., Dec. 1.—That the storm which swept the north Pacific coast on November 28 was far-reaching is indicated in a dispatch received from Wrangell, Alaska, today, reporting the wrecking of the Lincoln Rock light station on southeastern Alaska.
