WILL GIVE BASKETS FOR CHRISTMAS

LOCAL SALVATION ARMY POST PREPARING TO DONATE TO CITY'S POOR.

A large Christmas dinner to the worthy poor families in the city will be given by the Salvation Army for Christmas, and looking to this end the army workers are busy making the necessary preparations. This movement is in conformity with the custom of the large cities, and because of the fact that there are a large number of poor families in need, the local army has decided to pursue a similar course here this Christmas.

Each of the baskets will contain sufficient provision for a good Christmas dinner for a family of six. In the preparation of a dinner of this character there will be a great deal of expense, and the army will be dependent for success in this effort on the financial donations of the individual citizens and business men of the city.

Captain and Mrs. W. H. Knapp, commanding officers of the local organization, will have charge of the affair, and they are desirous of having all those who are able to contribute, and in the event that checks are sent these should be made payable to the Salvation Army, and mailed to the headquarters of the organization here, 635 Owen street.

In the event that the financial contributions received should be in excess of that necessary for the giving of the dinner, the money will be used by the army in its regular work of aiding the poor in this city. The local officers are also desirous that any person who should happen to know of any families who are deserving and in need, should send names and addresses, and provision will be made for them.

IN THE THEATERS

CLARK MAY BUILD SMELTER

BUTTE MILLIONAIRE PURCHASES RANCH AT BEARMOUTH AND CREATES TALK.

One day last week there was consummated a deal by which W. A. Clark, the Butte Millionaire, purchased and took over the ranch of J. M. Roehner at Bearmouth, and the people of that region are busy speculating as to what the big mining man intends to do with the property. The ranch is said to have brought a nice sum, but the exact amount is not known. Mining people of the vicinity firmly believe that Mr. Clark intends to construct a smelter at that place, one large enough to handle the ore from the mines at Clinton and in the Phillipsburg district. It is well known that the mines from the latter district are shipping their ores to Anaconda and Butte at a large cost, whereas, if they send their output to a smelter near Bearmouth, located as advantageously as it is, a large saving, and consequently bigger profits, could be made. The ranch is said to have 37 inches of available water-right, enough to operate a large smelter.

RICH ORE DISCLOSED BY DYING DEER

C. A. BELLMORE AND JOE DOBSON TELL STORY OF REMARKABLE DISCOVERY.

With their pockets bulging with copper ore and gold nuggets and with enough bear meat and venison in their packs to last them a month, C. A. Bellmore and Joe Dobson returned yesterday from a month's hunting and prospecting trip in the Four Corners country. The story that they tell of the trip is a romance in itself and the discovery of the copper ledge from which the ore that they display was taken rivals the discovery of the famous Comstock lode, which was unearthed by a feeding mule.

Mr. Bellmore owns a number of mining claims in the Martin creek district, out of Quartz, and the two men were working over these when they sighted a deer above them on the side of the mountain. A short chase placed them within range of the deer was brought down by a well placed shot. The buck was standing above them on the side of the mountain and as he fell he slid down the hill. When the hunters picked the animal up they sighted the green tint of a copper ledge. The deer in sliding down the hill had scraped off the moss from the ledge and the ore disclosed was so rich with the green metal that the men could hardly believe their eyes.

They hastily staked out a claim and after working for a few hours got the rich specimens of ore which they disclosed yesterday.

Another deer was procured in an equally strange manner. While walking over the hills the hunters sighted a cougar with a young fawn in its mouth. The lion was about 1,000 yards distant and the men shot at it 13 times without the bullets taking any effect. One of the last shots, however, came so close to the great beast that it impaled its hold on the deer the better to get out of the way. The animal was picked up by the men almost unmarked.

A big black bear, tipping the scales at 250 pounds, also fell before the rifles of the two hunters and this, with a large doe, was brought to town.

Mr. Bellmore owns 13 claims in this district and in working over one of these last month he washed out three nuggets of varying size, the largest of which is worth in the neighborhood of \$8. The whole lot being worth about \$13. He is a brakeman on the Northern Pacific.

JUSTICE WITHHOLDS DECISION

SECOND TRIAL OF T. C. PENNY HELD BEFORE SMALL AND ATTORNEYS ARGUE.

All of yesterday afternoon in the court of Justice of the Peace Small was taken up in the trial of T. C. Penny, proprietor of the Bijou moving picture show, who is facing a charge of keeping his place of business open on Sunday, in violation of a state law. This is the second trial of the case, the jury in the first trial, a week ago, having disagreed. This time there was no jury, the case going to the court on an agreed statement of facts. The defendant admitted that he had his place open on the day he was arrested; but his attorneys, Floyd Logan and Henry Stiff, contended, as was the case last week, that the state law does not apply to moving picture shows, as it was passed at a time when there were no such forms of amusement and that the state law applies to theaters only. County Attorney Mulmore, who prosecuted the case, contended that moving picture shows come under the head of theaters, thus bringing on an argument as to the definition of the word "theater." Most of the time was consumed by the defining of the word by the attorneys. At the conclusion of the arguments, Justice Small announced that he would give his decision at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon.
