

WOULD PLANT SEEDS CARNEGIE'S HOME IN OREGON AS SECURITY

MR. SMITH OF MARSHFIELD STEEL KING FORCED TO GIVE PLANS TO REFOREST LANDS BOND FOR CHAUFFEUR'S ON THE COAST.

Portland, Ore., Dec. 4 (Special).—Reforestation of cut-off areas of standing timber is the purpose of C. A. Smith, a large timber owner of Marshfield, Ore., and his efforts along this line are the first of a similar nature undertaken by any lumbering firm in this state. Mr. Smith proposes to continue the cutting of timber, but still not leave behind a barren cut-over country, but one covered with growing trees.

For some time this Oregon lumberman has studied the subject of reforestation and has come to the conclusion that to provide timber for the people of the future reforestation is absolutely necessary. Actual work along this line has been started. Two experts, one formerly in the employ of the government, have been engaged. Seeds have been gathered and the system of marking seed trees to be left standing has been adopted. During the winter the experts in charge will map out definite plans to be followed in the spring.

The Smith holdings are very large and lie on the western slope of the coast mountains about 2000 feet on the Oregon coast. The Smith mill cuts over 200,000 feet in a 10-hour shift. Another mill is now being built that will cut 125,000 feet in the same time, making a total cut of about 1,000,000 feet of lumber in a day and night run. The company owns a steam schooner that carries 1,500,000 feet of lumber for a cargo and takes quantities of the rough material to Bay Point, Cal., where the company owns a planing mill, and it is there finished for market. The Smith company owns a large mill at Minneapolis, only recently becoming interested in Oregon timber.

Washington, Dec. 4.—A complete investigation by a joint committee of congress into the customs service of the country in general and particularly into the alleged frauds perpetrated upon the government by the sugar trust is contemplated in a concurrent resolution which will be presented in congress by Representative Campbell of Kansas, today on Monday morning will talk over the provisions of the act with President Taft, having today made an appointment with the president for that time.

CRIME IS UNEARTHED WOMAN'S WORK

MRS. CORDEZ FOLLOWS CLUES FOR SIXTEEN MONTHS—POLICE FINALLY ACT.

St. Louis, Dec. 4.—For 16 months Mrs. Anna Cordez, 2519 Farrar street, St. Louis, has worked to dispel the uncertainty as to the manner in which her 16-year-old son, William, came to his death in Pittsburg Lake, near East St. Louis, Ill. As a result Mrs. Regina Kolbach, and four men, all residents of this city, are under arrest.

DEER LODGE COUNTY.

Mining has been active during the year and the development gives evidence of some extensive mineral leads, with every indication of permanency as far north as the Red Legion, where extensive exploring has been done. Cable and Southern Cross are the principal districts, in the latter the Southern Cross being extensively developed and large ore bodies explored.

FLATHEAD COUNTY.

Several mines are still operated, but work is confined to the extraction of ores opened up in the past. In the Beton district the Ripple Mining company has been a constant shipper. In the Bonshure district extensive development has been conducted and much new work has been done in other parts of the district.

POWELL.

Some of the best mining opportunities in any district of the state are to be found here. The Chair and Snowshoe district several promising gold and copper properties were developed and tests were made in a small way of properties near Helmsville and Ovando which encourage the belief that producing mines will be developed.

GRANITE COUNTY.

There has been much activity and promising veins developed. The mineral possibilities are great and development will be made with practical assurance of success.

RAVALLI COUNTY.

Much attention has been focused on the district in the Bitter Root range and development has been prosecuted with satisfactory results. The metalliciferous veins afford the most attractive possibilities for developing into large producing mines of a concentrating character.

ARMENIANS STARVING.

Worcester, Mass., Dec. 4.—Eighty thousand persons are starving in Armenia, according to advices received by Emily G. Wheeler, secretary of the National Armenia and India Relief association, and 5,000 orphans need aid. She said that unless aid is speedily sent a large number of Armenians will perish.

STEALTHY CONFERENCE AROUSES SUSPICION

New York, Dec. 4.—The secrecy of the meeting of Jeffries, Johnson and the fight promoters in a Hoboken hotel, just before announcing the signing of articles of agreement, is now believed by many sporting authorities to have been for the purpose of making a second and private agreement in which the principals stipulated to split the purse of \$101,000 evenly instead of 75 per cent to the winner and 25 per cent to the loser. We are striving for this end and in the name of the people of that noble nation, the United States of America."
