CALHOUN IS NAMED FOR CHINESE POST

Washington, Dec. 6.—Announcement was made at the state department today of the appointment of William J. Calhoun of Chicago as minister to China. Mr. Calhoun has accepted the appointment and the Chinese government has indicated its pleasure in receiving him. Mr. Calhoun is a well-known corporation lawyer in Chicago, having begun practice in Danville, Ill., in 1875. He has done some important diplomatic work during his career, notably when, at the request of President McKinley, he investigated conditions in Cuba prior to the outbreak of the Spanish-American war, and later when he investigated the differences between the asphalt companies and President Castro of Venezuela for President Roosevelt. For two years he was a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission. Mr. Calhoun is 61 years of age, and a native of Pittsburgh, Pa.

AVIATOR FERNANDEZ DROPS TO HIS DEATH

Nice, France, Dec. 6.—M. Fernandez, the aviator was instantly killed today, following the explosion of the motor when his aeroplane was being maneuvered at an estimated height of 1,500 feet. The machine crumpled and with its pilot dropped to the earth. M. Fernandez participated in the aviation contests at Rheims last August, but his performances there attracted no special attention. At that time he was operating a biplane. Fernandez was the third man to be killed in a motor power aeroplane. The first was the death of Lieutenant Seifried while flying as a passenger with Orville Wright at Fort Myer in September, 1908. E. Lefebvre, the French aviator, was killed September 7 last, when his aeroplane turned turtle two minutes after his flight had been made. Lefebvre was using a Wright machine.

MRS. GUGGENHEIM SEEKS ANNULMENT OF DIVORCE

Chicago, Dec. 6.—Hearing of arguments upon the legal competency of Grace B. Guggenheim, former wife of William B. Guggenheim, the New York financier, to file a petition asking for the annulment of a decree of divorce, granted her eight years ago, was begun here today. Former Mayor Edward F. Dunne, who was judge of the circuit court, and granted the original decree to Mrs. Guggenheim, in 1901, some months ago filed a petition as a friend of the court charging that the decree was obtained by fraud. Mrs. Guggenheim not being a resident of Chicago. Investigation of the charges was ordered by the court and today's action is the first active move in the case.

LABOR LEADERS TO MEET AT PITTSBURG NEXT WEEK

Pittsburg, Dec. 6.—One week from today the presidents of the various organizations affiliated with the American Federation of Labor will meet in this city to take action against the "open-shop" policy of the United States Steel corporation. It is expected the strike trouble at Bridgeport, Martin's Ferry, Wheeling and Pittsburg in the plants of the American Steel and Sheet Plate company, which is a subsidiary concern, will be given special attention.

A DEMENTED WOMAN.

Yesterday the sheriff's office attempted to enter into communication with relatives of Mrs. Susan Rice, a woman who was taken from a Northern Pacific train at Missoula. It is claimed that she is insane and that she attempted on several occasions to jump from the car in which she was riding. The woman was on her way from Florida to Seattle, where she has relatives.

Kansas City, Dec. 6.—Two men were killed and four others were injured following the explosion of a boiler in the basement of a six-story building at 912 Broadway, in the wholesale district, here today. One of the men killed was an expressman passing by on his wagon. The other victim and the injured were artisans employed in remodeling the building. The entire lower floors, which were vacant, collapsed.
