WINTER WHEAT IS IN FINE CONDITION

Washington, Dec. 7.—The crop reporting board of the department of agriculture today estimated that the newly seeded area of winter wheat is 7.9 per cent greater than the revised estimated area sown in the fall of 1908, equivalent to an increase of 2,448,000 acres, the indicated total area being 31,453,000 acres.

The condition of winter wheat on December 1 was 45.8 against 52.3 on that day a year ago.

The newly seeded area of rye is estimated at 1.2 per cent greater than the revised estimated area sown in the fall of 1908, equivalent to an increase of 25,000 acres, the indicated total being 2,125,000 acres.

The condition of rye on December 1 was 94.1, as compared with 87.6 last year.

The preliminary estimate of area sown to winter wheat this autumn and the condition on December 1 by states are given in the report. Among the states listed are these:
