THE CARRIER'S LIFE MADE EASY

ADVICE TO PATRONS OF THE UNITED STATES POSTAL SERVICE.

Many are the columns of advice which have been hurled at the head of the public regarding Christmas shopping and the mailing of Christmas presents, but the following, taken from the Postal Record for December, is the very latest. The rules are for the patrons of Uncle Sam's postal service and give all of the very best and most approved methods of making easy the troubled life of the letter carrier. At Christmas time they are very appropriate. The rules are as follows:

"Always be sure to ask the carrier if that is all. The monotony of the question is soothing to his nerves and it exercises the nerve of the patron. "Never fail to write your name in the wrong place upon the register receipt slip and card. What the carrier says when out of earshot is intended for the birds alone. "Let the carrier rap or ring twice before you respond once. "Stand inside the door and pull the lace curtains back and watch the carrier until he gets out of patience and starts off, and then open the door and say sweetly: 'Did you ring?'"

"Send the smallest child in the house to the door and be sure the door is locked. "Ask the carrier if he is not late, and before he can answer you ask him what time it is. "Tell him that your friend wrote you last Thursday and that you have not got the letter yet. When he says he has not seen the letter, tell him that's funny. Letter carriers have X-ray eyes and follow and keep tabs on every letter in the United States. "Ask the carrier to wait while you run to the third floor and get a stamp you forgot. "Call across the street and tell the carrier you want your mail first. You are entitled to your mail before anyone else. "Ask the carrier to bring you a 1-cent stamp next time he comes, and when he comes again tell him you have changed your mind and do not want it now. "Ask the carrier to please ask the postmaster to please search the post-office and see if there is not a letter of yours lying about somewhere. "When a holiday comes write to the postmaster and tell him that the carrier did not come around yesterday afternoon. This will be information for him. "Ask the carrier to register a letter for you and then hand him a \$20 bill to take the fee out of."

"Give your letter to your husband to mail for you and then start a tracer to find it in his pocket. Inspectors like to work upon fake cases. "By following the above rules you can make the most pessimistic carrier an optimist."
