PAINLESS OPERATIONS WITHOUT USE OF DRUGS

New York, Dec. 8.—Before an audience of distinguished surgeons Professor Thomas Jonnesco, the Roumanian scientist, yesterday demonstrated that painless operations could be performed on patients while they remained conscious. Professor Jonnesco hypodermically injected stovaine into the spine, at the same time administering strychnine to strengthen the heart.

Three children and a woman were operated on by local surgeons after Dr. Jonnesco had applied the stovaine. Dr. William J. Mayo of Rochester, Minn., attended the demonstration as the special guest of Professor Jonnesco.

Dr. Mayo was so impressed that he invited the Roumanian scientist to visit the west and demonstrate his discovery, and Dr. Jonnesco accepted.

ALEXANDER IS AGAIN LOS ANGELES' CHOICE

Los Angeles, Dec. 8.—Returns from 182 precincts out of 207 give George Alexander, incumbent, a lead of 1,637 votes over George A. Smith for the mayoralty. The missing precincts are in the residence district and are expected to increase the lead of Alexander. Returns from these precincts indicate the election of the entire Good Government league ticket, with the possible exception of one place in the city council. The vote for mayor, as counted so far, stands: Alexander, 16,642; Smith, 15,005.
