Tom Jackson and Pat Kelly, who were arrested Sunday night for breaking into the barn of the Missoula Investment company, taking therefrom a team of horses with the intention of taking a load of soldiers to the post, pleaded guilty before Justice of the Peace Small yesterday to a charge of malicious mischief and received the maximum sentence, six months in the county jail. Jackson is a young fellow who has kept the police busy for a long time. He has served time in the county jail, and the authorities insist that he is a fit subject for the state penitentiary. It was at first thought that a charge of horse stealing could be brought against the two, but it was seen that no intention of keeping the animals could be proved, hence the lesser complaint was filed. Jackson received the heavy sentence on general principles, while this court was so hard on Kelly because it was shown that he had engineered the escape of Saturday night.

TO LEAD MISSOULA HIGH
SCHOOL ATHLETES.**
