IN THE RAILWAY WORLD

SWITCHMEN'S PAY C. H. MARSHALL HAS
IS REDUCED RELAPSE

SPECIAL RATE PAID TO STRIKE-
BREAKERS HAS BEEN DIS-
CONTINUED.

The last lingering trace of the
switchmen's strike disappeared yester-
day with the announcement that the
men now employed as switchmen in
the local yards would be dropped down
to the regular scale. This means that
the men will receive the regular
switchmen's pay, which was raised 2
cents per hour just previous to the
strike.

Superintendent M. M. Fowler stated
yesterday that the men now employed
in the yards would, with one or two
exceptions, remain in the service. The
boarding car system which was orga-
nized during the strike will be dis-
continued during the next few days,
as the men have almost all found
boarding places, and no further trouble
is anticipated.

Switching in the local yards has
never been seriously tied up, and is
being handled as expeditiously now as
it was prior to the strike. Freight
traffic on the division is again nor-
mal, as shown by the reports for last
month. Minnesota transfer, the point
most affected by the strike, is being
cleared rapidly, and is expected to
be in smooth running order soon.
Nearly all the men, employed in the
yards at that point belong to the
switchmen's union, and the blockade
there assumed serious proportions at
one time.

MUCH SNOW FALLS
IN BITTER ROOTS

Freight traffic on the Puget Sound
is suffering on account of the heavy
snowfall in the Bitter Root mountains.
The rotary is working steadily, but
if the snow continues to fall as heavy-
ly as it has during the past 24 hours,
traffic will be seriously impeded. Pas-
senger trains were gotten through
nearly on time yesterday, No. 2 being
delayed an hour by a slide west of
Haugan. Snow to the depth of four
feet was reported yesterday after-
noon.

SLIDE NEAR HAUGAN.

Trains on the Puget Sound were de-
layed some time yesterday by a slide
which occurred west of Haugan. The
details are not known, but the slide
is supposed to have been caused
by blasting which was being done by
the engineering department.

MUST STAND TRIAL
ON CHARGE

CHARLES R. HEIKE IS NOT "IM-
MUNE" AND MUST FACE THE
COURT SOON.

New York, Feb. 14.—Charles R.
Heike, secretary of the American
Sugar Refining company, the sugar
trust, is not "immune." He will stand
trial beginning March 1 on indict-
ments charging him with other em-
ployees of the company of conspiracy
to defraud the government by under-
weighing imports of sugar. For weeks
counsel for Heike have attempted to
prove before a jury in the United
States circuit court that Heike should
not be prosecuted, as he gave testi-
mony before the grand jury that re-
turned the indictments. But in this
case, for Judge Martin ruled this
afternoon that the defendant was
not entitled to immunity. Accordingly,
he instructed the jury to bring in a
formal verdict dismissing the plea in-
terposed in the secretary's behalf.

MUST STAND TRIAL
ON CHARGE

In ruling against Heike today Judge
Martin referred to the danger that
would follow if indiscriminate pleas
at bar were entertained, and said it
would give rich men an opportunity to
avoid the administration of justice.
There has been no evidence, he said,
to show that the government was an-
tiquated by bad faith in bringing the
defendant before the grand jury or that
any effort was made to extract testi-
mony from the defendant that might
be used against him.

MUST STAND TRIAL
ON CHARGE

Seattle, Feb. 14.—Work was com-
menced today on the steel pier of the
Grand Trunk Pacific railroad. Steam-
ship services between Seattle and
Prince Rupert, B. C., will be begun in
July with three large new vessels con-
structed in Esquimaux. The site of the
new Union Pacific pier half a mile south
of the Grand Trunk property will be
turned to the railroad March 1 and
construction work will begin a month
later.
