

CANNON ADDRESSES THE HOUSE

SPEAKER TAKES THE FLOOR AND SOUNDS A WARNING TO HIS COLLEAGUES.

Washington, Feb. 14.—If we lose sight of our own importance and of our own position for the time being, there will come in our places better and wiser men who will not lose sight of the necessity to provide for an orderly procedure under which a majority can work it willy where responsibility rests there must be power with the majority to move on, being responsible.

"Uncle Joe" Cannon, laying aside his gavel and speaking today from the floor of the house, merely as "the gentleman from Illinois," sounded this warning to his colleagues. "Representative" Cannon arose for the purpose of lending his approval to the pending rivers and harbors appropriation bill, but during his speech, which lasted about 20 minutes, he took occasion to refer lightly to magazine and newspaper criticism and to criticize the minority members that the power of the majority was futile unless enforced by a well oiled machine.

It was while Representative Fitzgerald, democrat, New York, had the floor that members were surprised to see the speaker rise from a seat on the floor and inquire "Will the gentleman from New York yield to me?"

"I will yield to the gentleman—I belong from Illinois," replied Mr. Fitzgerald, smiling.

Mr. Cannon told the house how he voted for a river and harbor bill under President Arthur's administration and explained that he had voted to pass that measure over the president's veto. He said he had had some trouble in justifying that vote before his constituents but said he did so.

Very Glad. "I thanked God then and I thank God now," said Cannon, "that that constituency of the agricultural district of Illinois, and the patriotism crossed with breadth and intelligence to stand by me at the polls."

As the speaker was enlarging upon the need of the breadth of view to obtain approval all over the country for appropriations for river and harbor improvements, Representative Datzell of Pennsylvania, who occupied the chair, began hammering the desk before him with the speaker's gavel.

"The time of the gentleman has expired," he exclaimed, in mock severity. "May I have a minute more?" pleaded the speaker.

Mr. Fitzgerald then secured consent to have his time extended for five minutes and Mr. Cannon continued. With the eye of prophecy, he saw the nation's population growing from 90,000,000 to 100,000,000. Already we have half of the railroad mileage of the world, carrying almost a third of the products of the civilized world back and forth to market.

"Long before the 500,000,000 are here," he said, "if we are to depend on railroad transportation alone we will have the railway mileage multiplied by two, multiplied by three, by four. It is a long work to add to nature sufficient depth of water to carry the great and constantly increasing commerce."

Refers to Criticism. In conclusion with reference to attacks on his trip down the Mississippi with President Taft, Mr. Cannon said: "When I turned to come back from New Orleans, from the criticism I received, founded on incorrect information, I wondered whether I was afraid or horseback, whether I was I or somebody else. I expect we will continue to receive all kinds of fake information that our great metropolitan journals may continue, some of them, to make their papers from day to day, like the Yankee made his razors to sell. But I desire to say to the gentlemen on both sides of the house that in the last analysis that of the two great organizations, the minority from time to time putting the majority on its good behavior, seeking to become the majority, will come correct legislation, and correct appropriations for the greatest good of the people of the republic."

Montreal, Feb. 14.—The directors of the Canadian Pacific Railroad company today declared a dividend of 2 per cent on the preferred and 3 per cent on the common for the half year ending last December, payable April 1. There is a surplus for the half year ending December last of \$1,611,917.

ORDERS WITNESSES TO APPEAR

ATTORNEY FOR DR. HYDE WANTS DEPOSITIONS FROM EACH AND ALL OF THEM.

Kansas City, Feb. 14.—All witnesses who told their stories to the grand jury, which today began investigating the Swope mystery, may have to repeat them before Frank P. Walsh, the attorney who is prosecuting Dr. B. C. Hyde's suit for alleged slander. What transpires in the jury room may be kept a secret, but immediately after witnesses finished their testimony they were subpoenaed to give depositions before Mr. Walsh.

James A. Gayford, one of Mr. Walsh's associates, stationed himself near the entrance to the grand jury room and as the witnesses appeared to testify he served them with subpoenas.

Miss Pearl Keller, the nurse who attended Colonel Thomas H. Swope in his last illness, was commanded to appear in Mr. Walsh's office tomorrow morning. J. J. Maatly, an attorney for the Swope estate, called Virgil Conkling, county prosecutor, from the grand jury room and complained of his action. Mr. Conkling requested Judge Lafshaw of the criminal court to instruct the subpoena server not to summon the grand jury witnesses, but the judge declined to grant the request.

A movement to unify all the mining and mineral land laws will be one of the results of the congress and several new statutes for the regulation of mine inspection, the use of safety appliances and the diminishing of the loss of life in mining will be advocated.

MANY MONTANANS GET PATENTS

NINETY-NINE ARE ISSUED TO RESIDENTS OF THE TREASURE STATE.

Washington, Feb. 14.—(Special).—According to the annual report of the commissioner of patents, 95 patents were issued to citizens of Montana last year.

Major S. G. Reynolds, the agent of the government to the Crow Indians in Montana, who is in Washington for some time on government business, was one of the guests at the 25th annual dinner of the Gridiron club on Saturday night. Senator Carter was also a guest at the dinner.

According to statistics just available there are 14,324,027 members of the Catholic church in the United States, a gain of 111,576 during the past year. New York has the largest membership, 2,722,649; Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Ohio, Louisiana, Wisconsin, New Jersey, Michigan, Missouri, Minnesota, California, Connecticut, Texas, Iowa, Rhode Island, Indiana and Kentucky, following in order named with membership running in each state from 200,000 to 500,000.

The selection of Carl Rasch of Helena, formerly United States district attorney for Montana, as one of counsel for Secretary of Interior Ballinger, Land Commissioner Bennett and Assistant Commissioner Schwartz, in the forestry and land investigation being conducted by the joint congressional committee, met with general approval here. Mr. Rasch was chosen to represent these officials in the investigation because of his intimate association with and knowledge of land matters during his service as district attorney in Montana and his experience in the land office.

MARKET MOVEMENT OF THE DAY

New York, Feb. 14.—The principal fact imparted by the action of the stock market today was its lapse, in large part, into the hands of the professional element. The element had been impressed on Friday with assertions put in circulation regarding the contents of President Taft's speech. The perusal of the speech disclosed no sign of the retractions which had been broadly insinuated in some of Friday's reports, and the professional operators in stocks promptly retraced the steps they had taken on Friday, before the two-day holiday interval in the market. This was the cause of the marking back of prices from one to over two points in the opening transactions. The sustaining effect on prices and the scanty offerings of stocks caused fresh intimidation to the bear party. Western railroad traffic officials reported a large tonnage moving. Northern Pacific's December earnings statement bore testimony to the severe effects of storm blockades, in addition to the switchmen's strike in that territory. The decreased activity of the market is ascribed to the purpose to await more explicit information on sundry subjects. The large deliveries of copper into consumption during January are regarded as being prompted by the belief in an agreement among producers to restrict the output and there is apprehension that this laying of stocks will curtail the later demand for that metal.

Bonds were irregular. Total sales (par value), \$2,770,000. United States bonds were unchanged on call.

Helena, Feb. 14.—(Special).—The apportionment of public school moneys was announced today by state superintendent of public instruction Harmon. It is on a basis of \$2.75 a pupil. Under the apportionment the schools of Missoula county receive \$14,175; Ravalli, \$11,058.75; Sanders, \$2,966.25; Granite, \$3,980; Deer Lodge, \$12,150; Lincoln, \$2,835; Flathead, \$18,585. Silver Bow receives the largest amount, \$50,430; Cascade is next with \$25,325, and Lewis and Clark third, with \$18,750.
