NEWS OF THE RAILWAY WORLD
WASHOUT ON N. P. STATE ADVERTISED OBSERVATION CARS CAUSES DELAY
BY RAILROADS
REPLACED

TRAINS ON HILL ROAD ARE SERIOUSLY HAMPERED BY TRACK ACCIDENT.

The state of Washington is causing the Northern Pacific considerable trouble. Everything was running fairly smooth in that section, but increased snowfall and washouts have effectively delayed all western train movement. All trains from the coast have been marked up as indefinitely late and nothing certain can be ascertained as to their arrival. The Cascade range is again causing much trouble and a heavy snowfall has been reported from there. Aside from trouble with the snow, a washout at Pasco has contributed much toward the delay of trains and it is not known when the track can be repaired and the trains gotten through.

The Coeur d'Alene branch of the Northern Pacific is having much trouble with snow. The train from Wallace arrived here at 1:30 this morning and the westbound Wallace train was tied up at Saltese for the night, not daring to buck the snow after dark. It will reach Wallace about 9 o'clock in the morning.

Trains from the east are seriously delayed, arriving here about seven hours late. The nature of the trouble could not be learned at the local offices, but snow and cold are supposed to be responsible for the delay. Trains 3 and 4 were annulled yesterday. Those trains were out of service for several months and were put back on the new time card, owing to increased traffic. As the time card went into effect yesterday morning at 12:01 they will not reach here until Tuesday morning.

WIRES DOWN.
A small slide yesterday afternoon put the Puget Sound's wires out of business from St. Regis west. The damage will probably be repaired today.

DERAILMENT DASHES HOPES

PUGET SOUND IS UNABLE TO OPEN LINE SUNDAY ON ACCOUNT OF ACCIDENT.

The report of a big slide on the Puget sound, near Avery, has not been confirmed since the first rumor originated late Saturday evening. There is evidently no foundation for the report as the local Milwaukee office has not heard anything in regard to it.

The derailment of a rotary caused a postponement in the opening of the track through the Bitter Roots. The road was expected to be ready for business at midnight Sunday, but as the rotary was bucking the last five miles of track on this side of the range it struck ice under the snow and was derailed, sliding down the embankment. By great good fortune the plow did not tip over and was put back on the rails without necessitating a wrecker. However, if no more accidents occur, the silk train, which has been tied up at Falcon for the last few days, will get out of there at 2 o'clock this morning, accompanied by a rotary.

No improvement in the weather has taken place in the Bitter Roots. A blizzard is raging and from 8 to 16 inches of snow have fallen in the last 24 hours. Passenger trains were turned yesterday as usual, but are expected to go through today.

NORTHERN PACIFIC HAS NEW STYLE EQUIPMENT COMING FROM BUILDERS.

The Northern Pacific railway announces that it will receive from the car builders on March 10 new observation cars of the type now operated on the North Coast limited. These observation cars will thereafter be operated on both the North Coast limited and the Northern Pacific express, the latter being the fast through 72-hour train between Chicago and Portland. This train, which was placed in service last summer, has proven a most popular one, both east and west bound, and caters to a very high class of patronage. The Northern Pacific management, therefore, has determined to make it equal in character to the North Coast limited by providing these new observation-library-buffet cars carrying barber, bath, a library of current fiction and travel, and the popular magazines. This train provides a la carte dining car service all the way, is electric-lighted throughout and carries a standard drawingroom and a tourist sleeping car through between Chicago and Portland, as well as similar cars between Chicago and Seattle-Tacoma.

MAY BUILD BRANCH TO WALLACE

RESIDENTS OF PINE CREEK DISTRICT EXPECT CONNECTION BY PUGT SOUND.

Although no definite assurance can be obtained, there is hardly a doubt but that the Puget Sound will build a connecting line from the Pine Creek district to Wallace. Owing to the topography of the country the road cannot enter Wallace excepting from the west and the residents of the Pine Creek district feel certain that the survey will connect them with Wallace. The following is taken from the Wallace Times:

A force of seven surveyors for the Chicago, Milwaukee & Puget Sound railroad have just completed surveying work on Pine creek and are now starting in to survey towards Wallace. Residents of Pine creek who have talked with these men state that they are unwilling to tell the object of their presence in that section, but there is no doubt but that the proposed line connecting Wallace with the Milwaukee main line at St. Maries is to be a thing accomplished with no unnecessary loss of time. The surveyors have completed all work as far as the mouth of Pine creek.

ance was started by children, Archbishop Ryan issued a letter, read in every Roman Catholic church today, warning parents not to allow their children on the streets during the trouble.

Officials of the company declared tonight that they were not seriously concerned by the threatened general strike. At the office of the company it was said reports received from men who had attended the labor meetings showed that three votes had been necessary before strike resolutions were finally adopted.

More Cars.
More cars were in operation today than at any time in the strike. During the rush hours 1,040 cars were in operation and it was planned to run the regular Sunday night schedules of 540 cars. These plans had to be abandoned because of the riots which broke out at nightfall.

Two explosions of fulminate of mercury caps occurred on the Germantown avenue line tonight. In one case the windows of houses in the neighborhood were shattered.

In an attack on a car a motorman was stabbed in the back. His assailant escaped. Following an attack on a car in the northwest section, Thomas Wagner was shot through the chest by a policeman. Physicians say he cannot recover.

TIRESOME WRANGLE CONTINUES

FIGHT PROMOTERS STILL UNABLE TO AGREE ON SELECTION OF FIGHT SITE.

San Francisco, Feb. 27.—It is as uncertain tonight whether the Jeffries-Johnson championship fight will be held here or in Salt Lake City, as it was a week ago when Tex Rickard and Jack Gleason, the promoters, came to this city to meet in conference and arrive at an early decision of the matter. Gleason did not see Rickard today. When Gleason was asked if he had heard from his partner, he said:

"No; I have not. And when he wants to bring word to me he knows where he can find me. I say the fight will be held here. That is all there is to it."

J. B. Nelson, president of the Salt-air Beach company of Salt Lake City, is waiting with Rickard to have a meeting with Gleason. He refuses to discuss his plans, beyond admitting that he is still working to get the match for Salt Lake, and says that Gleason's final word will determine his action.

"I cannot say where the fight will be held until I have talked with Gleason again," said Rickard tonight. "I have had no definite understanding here with anybody, and I do not know that we can reach an agreement. I am anxious to have the thing settled one way or another."

WALK FOR WAGER.

San Jose, Cal., Feb. 27.—Dr. W. A. McEnery, formerly an English distance running champion, won a 106-mile walking match with Percy Selby, a San Francisco society man, today on a wager of \$7,500. The men left the Burlingame Country club at 5 o'clock yesterday morning and reached Monterey, the end of the course, at 5:15 o'clock this evening. Dr. McEnery was 20 miles ahead.
