

BUILDING OF TOWN SIGNIFICANT

AGGRESSIVE AND PROGRESSIVE SPIRIT OF NORTHWEST IS SHOWN BY WORK.

Spokane, Feb. 27.—Characteristic of the aggressive and progressive spirit of the northwest is the building of the town of Winchester, on Craig mountain, in northern Idaho, southeast of Spokane, a district made famous in the history of the inland empire as the stamping ground of Chief Joseph, head of the Nez Perce tribe, who gave General O. O. Howard such a merry chase a third of a century ago. The town, which today has a population of between 500 and 700, was part of the Nez Perce Indian reservation 50 days ago. It will have a population of 1,500 when the Craig Mountain Lumber company's big sawmill is opened in June.

The townsite overlooks beautiful Lake Lapwai. Romantic history tells it was on Camas prairie that the little Indian girl found Lewis and Clark, the explorers, in a famishing condition, worn and weary and hungry, and that she taught them how to dig the camas, or bread root, from which the great stretch of prairie derives its name, then pointed the way to water and guided them on their trail.

Today the vast wilderness of prairie, over which the Lewis and Clark explorers trailed, is changed as if by magic. Farmhouses surrounded by orchards and fields of grain dot the land for miles in all directions, and now man's enterprise is forcing its way into the heart of virgin forests, 4,000 feet above the level of the sea, on Craig mountain.

There was no indication of a town on the mountain three months ago. C. P. Lindsay of the Craig Mountain Lumber company, looked over the ground with other officials and they decided it was a likely place, and work began. Several store buildings and numerous small residences have been erected; a bank building, costing \$10,000, is almost completed. A commodious hotel, finished in the Swiss style of architecture, has been completed at a cost of \$5,000 and is now ready for occupancy.

The Craig Mountain railroad, five and a half miles, tapping the Camas prairie spur of the Northern Pacific

at Craig Junction, has been completed, and trains are now running. A dam 200 feet in length and 40 feet high, with a base and top of 24 by 6 feet, constructed of concrete, reinforced, at an expense of \$50,000, has already been completed across Lapwai canyon, forming a lake covering approximately 100 acres.

The town proper is laid out on a picturesque plateau covering 100 acres, and the principal streets and avenues, most of which are named after noteworthy pioneers of the district, or Indians famous in history, are graded, sidewalked and curbed.

Sofa Cushions of Peculiar Shape.
Brown suede leather, so extensively used for couch, settle and chair pillows, is made up into large pillows shaped like triangles and hearts. To make one it is necessary to cut a paper pattern of precisely the size desired and then shape the suede leather from it, leaving an inch margin all around so that when it has been machine sewed on the outer side the protruding edges may be picked or berringed with gold thread. Or the pillow may be bound with brown cord intermingled with gold tinsel and the corners decorated with gold lace or embroidery.

Three-Fold Use for a Belt Buckle.
A pretty belt buckle is a really valuable accessory of any girl's wardrobe providing that she knows just when to make it useful. In jade, Venetian work, Russian inlay, Japanese lacquer or lapis lazuli are buckles of moderate price which, when not needed for the belt may be swung, pendant fashion, by one of its cross bars from a neck chain. Without in the least degree interfering with the clasps, it is quite possible to have fitted to the back of any large-size buckle a stout pin and hook and use it for an evening cloak fastening.

mission house at the Kampola, Uganda. It was here that the ex-president met several men of international prominence in the missionary field, notably Bishops Tucker and Hanlin. It was here that Col. Roosevelt was presented to King Dandi.

Among those in the group back of the front row are seen a number of lady missionaries who are devoting their lives to the upbuilding of the dark continent.

It is proposed to have a big reunion the coming summer, when John Hoge of Zanoville and his brother, James Hoge of Seattle, will be with us."
