# BIG ELK COMPANY PROSPERS

FRANK R. LOWE AND H. H. M'VETY RETURN FROM A BUSINESS TRIP TO BUTTE.

The following, taken from the Anaconda Standard, tells of the Big Elk Mining company, in which are interested a number of Missoula people:

Frank R. Lowe, of Salters, and H. H. M'Vety, of Missoula, president and vice president of the Big Elk Mining company, were in Butte yesterday to consult with some of the local stockholders, and left for the west again last evening. President Lowe is very enthusiastic over the prospects of the Big Elk and says the mine will begin producing within three months or as soon as the Milwaukee road can build a spur from the main track to the mine, which is not more than 2,000 feet. The property of the Big Elk company, consisting of 21 claims, is situated just across the state line in Idaho, and at the Idaho portal of the Milwaukee railroad tunnel at Yaft. The property has been developed by a shaft and two tunnels, one being in about 150 feet and the other, farther down the mountain, being in about 250 feet. There are a number of veins on the property, but the main vein is the one upon which the work is being done, and it has a width of 60 feet between walls. In No. 2 tunnel, said President Lowe, an ore body 18 inches wide has been opened and it gives an average assay of 26.5 per cent copper, 6 1/2 ounces of silver and \$3.80 in gold to the ton. One shipment of the ore made returned 28 per cent copper, while a test in Helena gave a 25 per cent.

It is believed the Big Elk has the extension of the Monitor and Richmond vein. The company has valuable water rights and the ground is covered with timber. It is understood officers of the Milwaukee railroad are heavily interested in the Big Elk company.

# CHAMPIONSHIP GOES TO JUNIORS

UNIVERSITY SOPHOMORES LOSE FINAL BASKETBALL GAME OF CLASS SERIES.

After a game that was the hardest, fastest and generally the best of the interclass basketball series at the state university the team representing the junior class won the championship of the school from the sophomores yesterday to the tune of 14 to 11. The game was played in the gymnasium and, partly on account of the tag day held for the purpose of attracting spectators and partly on account of the fact that the interest in the championship game was unusually high, the big hall was crowded with interested enthusiasts.

The game was rough and lack of team work was noticeable at most stages of the game, but, aside from this, the contest was the best seen at the university in a long time. The two teams were the pick of the school and were evenly matched, and the game from start to finish was interesting.

The teams started out with a rush and for the first few minutes the game was all in the middle of the floor. The juniors soon took the lead, however, and from that time until the end of the game were well ahead. The first half ended with a score of 9 to 7.

In the second half the juniors started in with a rush and widened the gap between the two scores. As the game drew near the end, however, the sophomores gained in speed and raised the score to 11 to 14 before the whistle blew.

Ryan and Spencer starred for the juniors, between them making all of the points for their side, as well as doing the brunt of the work, while Winstanley, Buck and Baker did the stellar work for the sophomores. Every man of both teams did very creditable work and the prospects for a championship team next winter are bright.

The girls of the sophomore class sprung a big surprise on the crowd just before the game was started. As their team trotted on to the floor the girls loosened a big banner in the class colors and with the numerals 1912 upon it from the balcony, where it had been furled.

The lineup and the individual scores follow: Juniors—Ryan, center (8); Harry Macley, Holmes Macley and Johnson, guards; Spencer (6), and Forbis, forwards. Sophomores—Conner, center (2); F. Buck (5), and Winstanley (4), forwards; Thieme and Baker, guards.

This game marked the end of the basketball season and the undivided interest of the school will now be directed toward track and baseball. Director Rhodes has prepared a list of names of the men whom he thinks eligible for the two teams and as soon as the weather permits a practice will be started on the track as well as on the diamond.

# LOVESICK YOUNG LAD COMMITS FOOLISH ACT

Coroner W. D. Kendrick was called to Lathrop yesterday morning to investigate the death of Eddie Barta, the 11-year-old son of a mill worker at that place. It appears that the lad was a jealous temperamental and was driven to the desperate act of suicide by the loss of his "best girl," who was receiving the attention of another boy of the same age. The boy went to his room Monday evening, where he shot himself in the head with a .22 caliber revolver. His body was discovered about 8 o'clock that evening, but life was extinct.

The coroner investigated the affair and returned to Missoula. The body will be buried at Lathrop.
