## LOCAL MAN TO JOIN EXPEDITION

H. L. TUCKER TO ACCOMPANY PARKER-BROWNE PARTY TO MOUNT MCKINLEY.

H. L. Tucker, a man who is well known in Missoula from his former connection with the forest service, has been asked to accompany the Parker-Browne expedition to the top of Mount McKinley, and has accepted the offer. Mr. Tucker is now employed as a land examiner by the Northern Pacific railway company.

The expedition is being gotten together by Professor Parker of the department of physics of Columbia university, in New York, and Bellmore Brown, son of a well-to-do family of Tacoma. It will leave Seattle on May 3, according to the latest reports, and will consist of only a few members. Besides Professor Parker, Mr. Browne and Mr. Tucker, the party will comprise Fred Printz of Darby and an engineer to operate the motor boat which will form part of the outfit. It is understood that Printz, who is well known because of his share in the expedition of Dr. Fredrick A. Cook to Mount McKinley, has accepted the invitation to join the party.

Professor Parker is an experienced man in the art of climbing mountains. He accompanied Dr. Cook on the expedition of 1906, and became well acquainted with the latter. Besides the experience gained on that expedition, Professor Parker has climbed several high peaks in the Canadian Rocky mountains.

The primary purpose of the expedition is to gather scientific data from the region around Mount McKinley, but it is likely that an attempt will be made to climb the peak and recover the proofs which are alleged to have been left there by Dr. Cook, of late lamented memory. The party will leave Seattle by steamer and land at Tyonek, on Cook Inlet. From there the trip will be made on foot with a train of pack animals, a number of which have been provided.

## DELEGATES CHOSEN FOR COUNTY

COMMISSIONERS NAME FIVE MEN FOR BILLINGS CONGRESS—OTHER BUSINESS.

Missoula is to be represented at the good roads congress in Billings on June 16, 17 and 18 by O. E. Peppard, F. J. Erfert, A. K. Dyke, George Brooks and Kenneth Ross, these gentlemen having been named as delegates by the county commissioners during yesterday's session of the board. It is also planned that the commissioners shall attend the convention, in which there is great interest locally.

The commissioners named three county high school trustees yesterday, H. T. Wilkinson, A. J. Violette and C. A. Marion. Mr. Marion is a merchant of Frenchtown and the other two trustees are prominent residents of this city.

Francis A. Stear of the county high school was appointed a member of the county examining board, to succeed Dr. M. J. Elrod, whose term expires.

## A GREAT RECORD.

The ball this year will surpass in the completeness of its detail any of the previous efforts of the Woman's club which have been, themselves, signally successful. The date, as has been announced, will be April 1. The place will be Elite hall and the music will be furnished by Schander's orchestra. Aside from these general arrangements, much attention has been given to the details of the plans for the ball, and its success from a social standpoint is assured. Now it is the financial end which is concerning the members of the club. "We want to give our fund a good boost," said one of the managers of the ball to a Missoulian man last night. "We expect to start work on our club building in a very short time and we need the money. We need it, oh so much. We must start our clubhouse this spring and we don't want a debt. So we ask for generous patronage of this, our Easter ball."

## BRADT BOOSTS.

H. F. Bradt, agent of the Burlington, has been making Missoula a visit and during his stay talked interestingly to a Missoulian man about his observations in Montana this spring. "It is going to be a great year in this state," said he. "There is no section of it that I have not seen lately, and there is no section of it that is not lively. There is a tremendous influx of good citizens already settling in. The state is receiving attention in all parts of the east. The people who are coming are people with money to help develop the state. They are workers and there are few of the speculative element in the lot. They are settling fast in eastern and northern Montana already and I see a good many of them coming in here. Your reservation opening will bring some fine people here, and all your end of the state will be benefited. There will be more than those who have drawn chances. You will find other parts of your territory settling rapidly."

from a stay of several months on the coast. Yesterday he went out to his farm in Orchard farms and for the first time in months was contented and satisfied. 
