MODERN EXCHANGE FOR HAMILTON

ROCKY MOUNTAIN BELL TELE-
PHONE COMPANY ANNOUNCES
IMPROVEMENTS.

Hamilton, March 19.—Several promi-
nent officials of the Rocky Mountain
Bell Telephone company were in Ham-
ilton this week on business connected
with the extensive improvements that
are to be made in the company's local
exchange and lines in and about Ham-
ilton. The party included: C. M. Har-
dington of Butte, division commercial su-
perintendent; Mr. Dunlap of Butte, di-
vision plant superintendent; G. L. Pavy of
Missoula, division commercial man-
ager; Herbert C. Brown, an engineer from
Salt Lake City, and H. C. Denny of
Missoula, district plant chief.

While here the officials made ar-
rangements to extend the company's
cable facilities and to construct new
pole lines to handle the great amount
of new business that is coming in every
day. A carload of poles arrived this
week and will be used at once to ex-
tend the lines to reach new subscrib-
ers. Cables and material are on the
ground, ready for use in the work of
extending the service.

Egbert E. Miller, manager of the local
exchange, stated today that the
exchange business of the local office
would be handled from the new quar-

ters after the Hamilton book store by
May L. O. F. Gibbons, a Western Elec-
tric company man of Chicago, arrived
in Hamilton this week and is getting
things in shape for the installation of
the new board. He will have three or
four assistants here within the next
few days, when actual work will be
started.

The equipment for the new office
will be of the very best. A No. 9
common battery board will be installed,
which will insure the very best service
obtainable. All the office fixtures and
exchange equipment will be entirely
new and of the most modern pattern.
The furnishings of the office will be of
oak. The rooms for the new exchange
board are located on the second floor,
opening onto Main street, and are
roomy and pleasant. When located in
the new quarters, with the improve-
ments that are to be made without the
office, the local exchange will be one
of the best equipped and most modern
offices in the west.

J. E. TOTMAN GIVES NOVEL
PRESENT TO THE HAMILTON
CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Hamilton, March 19.—People passing
by the new quarters of the Hamilton
Chamber of Commerce yesterday paid
much attention to the section of a large
log which lay on the sidewalk in front
of the building. Early this morning
passers-by were interested in watch-
ing J. E. Totman and several men from
the lumber mill remove the large mass
of wood to the interior of the build-
ing, where it will serve as a registra-
tion table. The block, which is over
three feet in diameter, stands high
enough to be a convenient writing-desk

the Anaconda Copper Mining com-
