## MISSOULA ENJOYS "VIRGINIAN"

DRAMATIZATION OF WISTER'S NOVEL IS SEEN AT HARNOLD THEATER.

"The Virginian" jingled his spurs through the four acts into which Wister's novel has been divided before a rather small audience at the Harnold theater last evening. The play in itself is all right and Missoula liked it. It tells of life in Wyoming in the early '80s and there is enough artillery on the stage at times to supply Fort Missoula. Still, the six-shooters of the play are usually seen and not heard—like good little boys and girls—and there are only three deaths in all four acts, an average that would make Lincoln J. Carter sneer. At that only one of these removals is accomplished where it can be seen; it is a good bit that the repertoire companies will write in a few homicides when "The Virginian" hits the twice-a-week houses, about five years from now. By the way, there were only two killings, after all, for one of the corpses came back to bow and looked as if getting lynched were a pastime for him. Indeed, he smiled as if he had enjoyed being hanged.

Missoula never saw "The Virginian" before last night, all reports to the contrary notwithstanding and locally we have nothing to judge the relative merits of the title role as portrayed by Dustin Farnum and William L. Gibson. Mr. Gibson pleased his audience last evening. He is wild enough, but not quite as wholly as he might be. Marshall Farnum, in the part of Trampas, did much clever work. The supporting company is not to be criticized. The setting was elaborate and much attention was paid to detail.


