# BULLET AT SPECTER CAUSES SUIT

JOHN GOGAS SUES PETER CHERETTE FOR WOUNDED ARM—WANTS A THOUSAND.

An unusual suit, one that reminds pioneers of former days of wooliness, was filed in the district court yesterday, John Gogas being the plaintiff and Peter Cherette the defendant. Both of these men are residents of Iron Mountain, and it was in a hotel in that town that the accident that caused the suit happened. It was on September 29, 1907, and Gogas was running the hotel. Cherette was a guest. His room was immediately below that of his landlord. During the night Cherette was seized with hallucinations of a very vivid sort and unlimbered his artillery to defend himself against the specters that attacked him. He fired a volley and John Gogas, in the room above, clapped his left hand over a splintered right arm. The suit of yesterday estimates the value of that arm at \$1,000. The story of the shooting is not told in the complaint as it is in this story—not exactly. The complaint talks about "gross negligence," or something like that, but the manner of the wounding of the landlord is still well remembered.

# FOREST SETTLEMENT IS DISCUSSED

SUPERVISORS CONTINUE MEETINGS AND TALK ON IMPORTANT POLICIES.

The subject of the morning meeting of the national forest supervisors' meeting yesterday was "Permanent Improvements on National Forests," which was explained in detail by Elers Koch, supervisor of the Lolo national forest, with headquarters in Missoula, and Supervisor Page S. Banks. Each gentleman spoke for 20 minutes on the subject and brought forth some very useful information. An informal discussion, participated in by all the supervisors, followed the addresses.

The afternoon session was devoted to the subject of "Forest Settlement and Policies," by R. H. Rutledge of the district offices and Supervisor Torr Steens. Forest settlement, especially as regards the homestead laws on national forests, is one of the important themes of the forest service, and the information in yesterday's papers on the subject was extremely instructive. A discussion of the various points which were mentioned in the addresses followed.

Another evening session was held, at which a discussion of forest settlement was given. The principal item was the matter of opening agricultural lands on the national forest to settlement under the homestead laws. The discussion dealt with the proposition of how to determine which lands on the forests are agricultural in their nature and are thus open to settlement.

### RETURNS TO MISSOULA.

Homer F. Tripp, who has been in Boston for the past four months, has returned to Missoula and will today resume his position as chief draughtsman in district No. 1 of the forest service. Mr. Tripp was employed for four months in the draughting department of the war department at Boston and, while he was away enjoyed himself immensely. But was glad to return to the Garden city. His family, consisting of Mrs. Tripp and two small sons, will arrive in Missoula in the near future and make their home here. They are now in New York.

### LINFIELD IN TOWN.

F. B. Linfield, director of the state agricultural experiment station at Bozeman, spent a few hours in Missoula yesterday. Mr. Linfield is on his way home, after a visit in the Bitter Root, where he is establishing a station for the study of the woodtick.
