

# REPUBLICAN TICKET IS STRONG

### MEN NAMED FOR CITY OFFICE ARE WELL KNOWN AND RESPONSIBLE CITIZENS.

The men whom the republicans have named as candidates for the coming city election are all representative citizens and men who have been associated closely with the growth and progress of the city. All of them are men who are known by the voters and who have reached a position of importance in the city through their connection with its growth. They are men who have personal interests here. All of them own property in the city, most of them have families here and all of them are fully acquainted with civic conditions and needs in Missoula. There is not one of the republican candidates who is not truly representative of the city and each one of them has fitted himself for public service by his work within the city.

#### Hatheway.

Thomas G. Hatheway, Jr., the republican candidate for city treasurer, is just completing his first term in that office. He has made an enviable record for himself during the past two years, and those who have been watching the progress of the city's administrative work say that he is the best treasurer that Missoula ever had. During the first 18 months of his term he took in more than \$40,000 in license alone—more than any of his predecessors ever collected in a full two-year term. He has made an enviable record for himself during the past two years—a record which is appreciated by all who have watched it. Mr. Hatheway came to Missoula with his parents in 1878 when he was but a year and a half old. He is therefore a Missoula product to all intents and purposes. He has spent his life here and has been intimately associated with the growth of the city. He is making Missoula citizens of his children.

#### Phillips.

Captain Phillips is not only a citizen-candidate for police judge, is a native of Massachusetts. He came to Missoula from Michigan in 1887 and has lived here ever since. He has been prominent in business and political circles since he became associated with Missoula. He has held several public offices, principal among which was justice of the peace. He served in this capacity for several terms and made a record which is indeed enviable. His long experience in this line makes him a desirable candidate for the office of police magistrate. Captain Phillips is not only a citizen of Missoula, but he has extensive property interests here. He owns his home on Madison street, where he has lived since he came here and where he has raised his family.

#### Merriam.

James Merriam, the candidate for alderman from the First ward, was born in Chicago. He came west from the Windy city when a young man and moved to Missoula from Butte in 1892. He has lived here for seven years and for six years has been in business for himself as an electrician and a dealer in electrical supplies. He has built up a good business and has proved himself a good and representative citizen during his residence here. He lives at 914 Vine street, on the east side of the Rattlesnake, and his election will mean that the east side district, so long without a representative and so much in need of a good man in the council, will have a direct voice in the city government. For years the east side has been neglected by the city. The people in the Rattlesnake have been without a good representative for a long time and Mr. Merriam will be the first councilman in a long time from that part of the city.

#### Angevine.

H. W. Angevine, the republican candidate for alderman from the Second ward, needs no introduction to Missoula people. He has served the city in many capacities during the past, and through his untiring service has gained an experience which will be of great benefit to him as a member of the city council. He came to Missoula in 1885 as the superintendent of bridges and buildings on the Northern Pacific. He served as an alderman from 1890 to 1892, and it was while he was in office that the first steel bridge across the Missoula river was built. Mr. Angevine's advice was of great help to the city at that time, and it was due largely to his counsel that the bridge question was so favorably decided. Mr. Angevine also served as chief of police and street commissioner

## INTEREST AROUSED IN MEETING

### MANY DELEGATES ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND LAYMEN'S CONVENTION IN BUTTE.

A committee of prominent laymen of the Butte church is planning for one of the greatest conventions of the kind that has ever been held in Butte. This is one of the 78 conventions that are being held in as many cities of the United States. These conventions have already been held at Denver, Salt Lake, Boise, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Fresno and Sacramento. This week the speakers will be at Portland and Tacoma, next week at Seattle and Spokane, coming from there to Butte. The convention in Butte will open with a big laymen's dinner on the evening of April 12. It will be followed by two of the strongest speeches of the convention. The opening dinner has been a popular feature of these conventions, and this a unique feature of this convention. The interest in the western cities are taking in this movement is remarkable. Boise had 1,400 men present, nearly 500 coming from out of town, and some traveling 500 miles. Los Angeles had 1,700. Seattle expects to have 2,700. Large delegations are being registered from the other cities of Montana. Anaconda expects to have 150. They will come by a special train on the afternoon of April 12. Missoula will have 100. Similar delegations are expected from other cities. W. D. Molloy, the executive secretary of the local committee, will address local rallies in Bozeman on Friday, Missoula on Sunday evening and Deer Lodge Monday evening, with a view to getting large delegations registered from these points.

#### Better Informed.

The purpose of the convention is to get the men of western Montana better informed about the great good that is being done by foreign missions. The endeavor is to get the men of each church organized to try to secure a more thorough education and get each man to contribute more generously and systematically to the work of the foreign board of the church. The convention will look to the training of leaders, who will return to their respective communities and make this interest permanent. Some of the strongest missionary speakers now in America will be present during this convention. Among those already assured are: Mr. J. Campbell White, general secretary of the laymen's missionary movement, New York; Bishop J. F. Robinson, Methodist bishop in India; Rev. O. M. Hansen, Baptist missionary from Burma; Rev. J. P. McNaughton, for 25 years a missionary in Smyrna; Rev. F. M. Stead of Persia; Rev. J. L. Deering of Japan; Rev. W. R. Hotchkiss of Africa; and Mr. C. V. Vickery of the Methodist church, and Ernest Hall of the Presbyterian church, The Rt. Rev. L. R. Brewer, bishop of Montana, and other prominent men of the state will speak during the convention. A complete program will be issued later.

#### Self Entertaining.

The convention will be self-entertaining. A registration fee of \$1 will be charged all delegates, both residents and visiting delegates, in order to meet the necessary expenses of the convention. Ladies also may register, and will be given reserved seats at all the sessions, including the opening one. The dinner is for the men, the charge for this will be 50 cents additional. The registration tickets marked "\$1.50 Paid" admit to the dinner also. Under no condition will a collection or subscription be taken during the convention. Arrangements are being made with the various railroad companies for a one and one-third fare round trip rate on the certificate plan. One fare is paid on the going trip and a receipt should be secured from the selling agent, which when validated here entitles to one-third fare on the return trip. The Missoula co-operating committee is composed of Messrs Craig, Plant, Fox, Hershey, McEwen, Arthur, Robertson, Dunham, Wickes, Madsen, Effinger, Hiscock, Patterson, Hollingsworth, Himes, Baxter, McDowell and Becker.

## BIG FUND IS RAISED TO ASSIST DR. COOK


