

MARKET MOVEMENT OF THE DAY

New York, April 12.—The action of the stock market today was watched with curiosity and some anxiety for indications of the wider effects of yesterday's action of the supreme court and the effect it will have in delaying the final settlement of the trust cases.

It was evident that the violent rise in prices yesterday had brought into the market large selling orders both for home and foreign account. Side by side with these was an influx of further buying orders. The latter were believed to be largely for shorts, bears having become alarmed over the sudden rise of prices.

Other developments were of mixed effect. The public pronouncements of executive heads of the United States Steel corporation and the Amalgamated Copper company professing satisfaction with trade conditions seemed to be taken with reserve.

President Ryan's hopeful analysis of the copper trade conditions encountered the falling price of copper metal in that market and Chairman Gary's incidental reference to the falling off of unfilled orders on hand to be shown at the beginning of the new quarter received as much attention as his claims for a rising scale of orders in the current business of the corporation.

Provisions were unsettled and closed heavy. Final quotations on May were: Pork, \$22.95; lard, \$13.07; and ribs, \$12.80.

New York, April 12.—Money on call firm, 3 1/2% per cent; ruling rate, 3 1/2% per cent; closing bid, 3 per cent. Time loans very dull and steady; 60 days and 90 days and six months 1/4 to 1/2 per cent.

Chicago Livestock. Chicago, April 12.—Cattle—Receipts estimated at 3,500; market weak to shade lower; beefs, \$5.85 to \$7.55; Texas steers, \$4.90 to \$6.35; western steers, \$5.60 to \$6.85; stockers and feeders, \$3.85 to \$6.45; cows and heifers, \$2.75 to \$7.10; calves, \$7.00 to \$8.50.

Chicago, April 12.—A strong combination of bearish influences forced wheat still lower today, but shorts bought freely late in the day, which caused a substantial rally. Additional rains in a large section of the winter wheat belt proved a ruling factor in the weakness.

Chicago, April 12.—The armored cruisers Tennessee and South Dakota sailed today for Buenos Ayres, where they will participate in the celebration of the centenary of the Argentine Republic.
