

# HIGH COMPLIMENTS EXCHANGED

FALLIERES GIVES TOAST TO MR. ROOSEVELT AND LATTER MAKES REPLY.

Paris, April 22.—President and Mme. Fallieres tonight gave a dinner of 104 covers at the Elysee palace in honor of Theodore Roosevelt. The entire palace was illuminated and guards lined the stairways. President Fallieres took out Mrs. Roosevelt, who looked charming in a blue brocade gown embroidered with gold and crystal ornaments, while Colonel Roosevelt escorted Mme. Fallieres. Miss Ethel Roosevelt, who wore a gown of pink satin, was escorted by M. Jusserand, the French ambassador to the United States. Among the other distinguished guests were Ambassador and Mrs. Bacon, former President and Mme. Loubet; M. Briand, foreign minister and Mme. Fiechon and other members of the cabinet and their ladies; Louis Renault, permanent delegate to The Hague tribunal from France; Baron d'Estournelles de Constant and the Baroness de Constant, and Frank H. Mason, the American consul general and Mrs. Mason, Admiral Lepout, and M. Boutroux, professor of philosophy in the University of Paris. During the dinner, served in the gorgeous Salle de Fetes, which is hung with priceless Gobelin tapestries, the band of the Republican guards rendered a musical program.

In proposing Colonel Roosevelt's health President Fallieres said: "I cannot allow the dinner to terminate without offering a toast to Theodore Roosevelt—an illustrious man who is at the same time a great citizen, a great friend of France and a great friend of peace. I lift my glass also in honor of Mrs. Roosevelt, to whom goes out the homage of our respectful sympathy. I congratulate myself at being able to tell our guests how happy we are to receive and fetter them."

### Replies in French.

Colonel Roosevelt replied in French, saying he was profoundly touched by the words of President Fallieres. "Mrs. Roosevelt and I," continued the American, "will never forget the welcome we have received in France, especially from you, Mr. President. Made to know and understand each other, our two countries have been friends from the beginning and no doubt will always remain friends in the future. Mary Garden and M. Salze sang the duet from Romeo and Juliet and M. Monnet-Sully and Mme. Bartet recited selections from Victor Hugo's works. At midnight a buffet supper was served.

Tomorrow Colonel Roosevelt's time will be devoted entirely to the program at the university.

## EIGHTEEN MINERS ARE KILLED

LIVES SNUFFED OUT BY TERRIFIC EXPLOSION IN OHIO PROPERTY.

Steubenville, Ohio, April 22.—The lives of 18 miners were snuffed out in a tremendous explosion in the Youghiogheny and Ohio Coal company's mine at Amst-erton last night. Seven men, bruised and burned, were rescued from the mine and their escape from death is regarded as miraculous.

The interior of the mine was wrecked and all ventilation shut off. The cause has not yet been determined. The mine had been inspected but two days before the explosion by Deputy Inspector Thomas Morrison. The condition underground, it is said, shows that the explosion in point of force was the greatest ever recorded in Ohio. When the explosion occurred people thought there had been an earthquake. A train was passing the mine and every window in every car was shattered. The trainmen fled, as a car of dynamite was attached to the train.

After working all night the rescuing crews located six bodies. These were taken to the bottom of the shaft and at noon today were lifted to the surface. During the afternoon Government experts from the geological laboratory at Pittsburg arrived with oxygen outfits. They failed to find more bodies. E. O. Jones, the night superintendent, was blown over several cars and gas and flames passed over him. When he was found he was badly burned and bruised. All the other men rescued were burned, but none seriously.

Two men, brothers, were found locked in each other's arms. This leads to the belief that the men were not killed instantly but were suffocated by afterdamp.

Late today the fans were put into operation and fresh air was forced into the mine. Three shifts are working two hours at a time. F. M. Osborne of Cleveland, president of the company, arrived this afternoon. He said the mine would be immediately cleared and work resumed as the mine inspectors report it safe.

## TROUBLE IS BREWING IN COTTON CIRCLES

Liverpool, April 22.—The discovery of forged bills of lading for cotton purporting to have been shipped from the United States has involved probably 30 local firms in the cotton market.

In addition to the Liverpool concerns a number of continental houses are affected, many of them having paid considerable sums on alleged false bills of lading. Cotton worth \$2,500,000 is said to be involved in the deals. Firms are arranging to take joint action in the matter and it is understood their representatives are going to Alabama to investigate the suspension of the cotton firm of Knight, Yancey & Co., of Decatur.

## BOILING VOLCANO OF OIL IS CHECKED

Oakland, Cal., April 22.—The boiling volcano of burning oil, which has been sending up flames and smoke and threatening lives and property from the Standard Oil company reservoir near San Pablo has been tamed at least and the big force of fire fighters promised that the monster will be under full control before tonight. Work of repairing the damage, estimated by the officials at almost \$200,000 has already commenced.

The origin of the fire is still a mystery, but the suggestion of an incendiary source is denied by the company officials.

## SEVERELY ASSAIL TEDDY

PARIS PAPER AND WRITER PUBLISH SEVERE CRITICISMS OF AMERICAN.

Paris, April 22.—The only discordant note heard from the Paris press in its comment upon Mr. Roosevelt's visit comes from the usual source, the Gilblas, which openly derides the American guest as "A Charlatan."

Frederick Masson, who is now one of Mr. Roosevelt's colleagues in the French institute and noted for his ultra Catholic and royalistic views, writing under the heading, "Hail, Caesar," publishes a remarkable attack in which he paints Mr. Roosevelt as a demagogue who with all the skill of a Barium is arranging for his re-appearance upon the American stage.

Masson adds: "American democracy needs a conciliator whatever his title may be, whether it is president, protector or even emperor, it is only by an extra constitutional concentration of legislative and executive powers that such a conciliator can fulfill his mark."

"The American people without exactly knowing what the trouble is or what the remedy is to be, will acclaim the man who will plunge a red hot iron into the wounds. It will follow such a man, American imperialism will end sooner or later in Caesarism. The United States of America have found their Caesar. He may not please the Latins, it is enough that he pleases his people."


## LINCOLN DEMOCRATS TO HOLD MEETING
