

A. P. MEMBERS HOLD MEETING

ELEVENTH ANNUAL SESSION IS HELD IN THE WALDORF-ASTORIA IN NEW YORK.

New York, April 26.—Members of the Associated Press met at the Waldorf-Astoria for the 11th annual meeting. The attendance was the largest ever gathered at a similar meeting. After the reading of the various committee reports, elections were held to fill seven vacancies in the board of directors. The voting resulted in the following elections:

MARKET MOVEMENT OF THE DAY

New York, April 27.—The stock market put in an active forenoon in efforts to appraise the significance of the increase in the United States Steel dividend yesterday. Without having come to definite conclusions on that point, a rise in the call loan rate diverted attention from a new element. There was no consensus of opinion on the inferences to be drawn from the United States Steel quarterly report and the increase in the dividend. The bull party in the speculation answered the contention that the quarter's earnings were disappointingly small by citing that the successive months of the quarter showed progressive increase in earnings. March earnings rising to a record for any March in the history of the corporation. The bear party made much of the current report of subsiding demand for steel products, the talk of accumulative report of subsiding demand for iron. The bear party had asserted its determination before and to sell the stock in the event of the dividend being raised on the ground the action would exhaust the available helpful factors toward advancing the price. The action of the banks in selling loans aggravated the selling pressure on the market. The shipments of gold by today's steamer brought the week's outgo to \$14,500,000. The fall in prices of wheat and cotton relieved anxiety over crop damage to some extent and helped to lower the morning prices. This did not avail, however, against the selling pressure which closed the market weak and at declines of from 1 to 2 points for the active stocks.

Bonds were irregular. Total sales, (par value), \$2,183,000. United States 2s registered declined 1-8 per cent in the bid price on call.
