## HIGH SCHOOL TEAMS ARRIVE FOR MEET

**BOZEMAN AGGIES MAKE HIT WITH COLLEGE BAND—REPRESENTATION GOOD.**

Every train which entered the city yesterday carried its quota of high school athletes ready for the interscholastic meet, which begins tomorrow, and by night the town was filled with "rah-rah" boys in miniature, covered with flying ribbons and filled with noise. Today the greater number will arrive and by tomorrow evening things will be in full swing. The Butte crowd will be in today and has promised to bring plenty of excitement. Much interest was created yesterday afternoon by the arrival of the agricultural college delegation with the college band and some 50 strenuous rosters. "Smiling Louie" Howard, formerly of the university, leads the band and his appearance yesterday was the cause of a general celebration. The school of mines teams will be in this morning, although Captain Milton Reid and two of his men got here yesterday. The high school teams which have arrived here so far are: Flathead county, Anaconda, Butte (debuters), Broadwater county, Chisnook, Columbus, Custer county, Fergus county, Forsyth, Jefferson county, Park county, Glasgow and Gallatin county. This is the first time that either Glasgow or Chisnook county has been represented, and, while the two sent only a disclaimer apiece this year, it is a good sign of a larger representation in the future.

## MINERAL LOCATIONS NUMEROUS

DUNCAN McDONALD TELLS OF THE STAMPEDE FOR GOLD ON THE RESERVATION LANDS.

Duncan McDonald, judge of the Flathead tribe, is in the city, having come down from the reservation last night. He confirms the reports that have been current about the activity in locating mineral land on the reservation since the opening and says that the stampede shows little sign of abatement.

"The hills about Ravalli before daylight on the morning of the opening, looked like a Fourth of July illumination," said Mr. McDonald last night. "There were lanterns moving everywhere, all the way down to Dixon. Many locations were made and the locators are all at it. Some of the notices are posted in ridiculous places. 'Two or three years ago,' continued Mr. McDonald, 'I was hiding out from Ravalli with Dr. Heidemann, the agency physician, when I noticed a hole that had been freshly dug in the hillside. I at once thought somebody had been prospecting, as I had known of mineral in that hill for a good many years. So I left the doctor and hastened back to my home for the necessary equipment. Then I hurried to where I had seen the hole. It was there, all right, freshly dug and there were some faint traces of mineral. While I was wondering who had been digging there, I noticed two things. First, I thought the hole had some of the appearance of a coyote den. Second, I saw a camp of Crees down at the foot of the hill. I went down there and asked the Indians if they had been digging and they showed me some young coyote pelts; they had dug out the den and captured the coyotes for the bounty. I was up there the other day and I found that somebody had posted a location notice at that old coyote hole. That ought to make a good mine, the Crees made money out of the digging they did there."

"Some years ago there was what looked to be a rich bit of float found along the river above Dixon. Above it was a ledge of barren quartz but the man who found the float thought it came from that ledge. When the opening came, he took one of his old friends—a Missoula man whom you know well—and showed him the ledge. He didn't look good to the Missoula man and he said so. I was along and when the Missoula man asked to see the float and it was shown, I was able to tell him where the ledge cropped out a mile or so away. It was peculiar rock, streaked with black, and easily recognized. The prospector said the black streaks were rich in gold and silver. So some claims were located on the ledge and the matter was to be kept a secret. Like all secrets it leaked out and during the next few days that vein was followed all the way down to Dixon and located. The locators think they have something good but I saw an assay certificate of the black rock and it runs a little over twenty cents a ton. There will be some abandoned claims there when it is known how the assay went."

Mr. McDonald has some specimens of galena that look good; he found them on the reservation and he is going to see what there is in the lead that he has discovered. As to the election at the mission, which was mentioned in The Missoulian's special news yesterday, Mr. McDonald said: "It is not easy for Paul and me to leave for the trip to Washington and we don't like to take it, but we are going, and we are going because we feel that it is time the Indians had proper representation in the councils at Washington. For years they have been sending old, prejudiced men, ignorant Indians, who have done the tribes no good and who have made a mess of things generally. The vote of the Indians which defeated the discontented element, shows they are tired of it."
