

# BUSINESS MAN DIES BIG SUM CLAIMED AT GRANTS DALE

THOMAS J. HOLT, FOR TWENTY YEARS A RESIDENT IN VALLEY IS BURIED.

Hamilton, May 11.—Funeral services over the remains of Thomas J. Holt were held yesterday afternoon at Grantsdale, burial taking place in the Grantsdale cemetery. The services were in charge of Rev. Thomas H. Barker, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church of this city. The services were largely attended by people from Hamilton and the surrounding neighborhood.

The deceased was 75 years of age and had been a resident of Grantsdale for more than 20 years, coming to the Bitter Root valley from Nebraska. Since coming here he has been engaged in the handling of general merchandise and had made many friends. He was a veteran of the civil war and a member of the Grand Army post of this city. He was the father of several children: Mrs. S. C. Teale of Seattle, Thomas Holt of Spokane, J. W. Holt, A. F. Holt and J. F. Holt of Grantsdale, Robert Holt of Great Falls and Mrs. L. C. Murton of Republic, Wash.

# WANTS FEE FOR "FIXING UP AFFAIRS" IN AN INTERNATIONAL WEDDING.

Pittsburg, May 11.—The details of arranging a settlement for an international marriage and legal work necessary to protect the estate of a daughter of a wealthy American from creditors and relatives of her husband after his death are made public today in an affidavit and statement of claim filed in the common pleas court by O. E. Bodington against John G. Leishman, American ambassador at Rome, whose home is in Pittsburg. The statement is in connection with the writ of foreign attachment filed in the April term of court. It alleges that Ambassador Leishman is indebted to Bodington in the sum of 22,000 francs, equivalent to about \$3,500. The statement declares Bodington performed legal services for the ambassador's family about four years ago in connection with the legal affairs of a daughter, Martha Leishman, now the Countess de Gontaut. It is alleged 2,000 francs are due Bodington for his services in advising Leishman and his daughter as to the French law regulating contract for separation of property, was executed on the marriage of Miss Leishman with Count Louis de Gontaut. The statement also covers claims for fees alleged to be due Bodington for services rendered in "staving off" creditors of the count.

# SUSPECTED ROBBERS CAUGHT BY OFFICERS

Reno, Nev., May 11.—Ten men were gathered up in Sparks last night by Deputy Sheriff Jack Sheehan in connection with the dynamiting end robbery of the postoffice at Dutch Flat, Cal., on May 5.

Three of the men captured were later released as nothing incriminating was found on them. Nitro glycerine, gun cotton, dynamite caps and fuse were found in the possession of some of the men, while a complete set of burglars' tools was hidden in the clothing of another.

# WILL LEAVE SERVICE ON JUNE 1

### ALFRED BEAMER, SUPERINTENDENT OF IDAHO DIVISION OF THE N. P., RESIGNS.

Spokane, May 11.—Alfred Beamer, superintendent of the Idaho division of the Northern Pacific railroad, stationed at Spokane, has resigned to take effect in June and will be succeeded by J. M. Rapelle of Missoula, now superintendent of the Rocky Mountain division. Mr. Beamer will devote his time to extending the use of the A. B. C. block system of train dispatching, of which he and T. H. Langtry, trainmaster of the Northern Pacific in Spokane are inventors and patentees, on lines in various parts of the United States, with headquarters in Spokane.

Mr. Beamer has arranged for a thorough demonstration of his system at the national convention of train dispatchers of North America in Spokane, June 21 to 24, when 500 delegates from roads in the United States, Canada and Mexico will be in attendance. Special wires will be run into the convention hall so that the dispatchers can become familiar with the workings of the system, which is designed to prevent collisions. The new device is a reversal of the system now in use throughout the country. It has been used on the Idaho division of the Northern Pacific road the last three years and no defects have been discovered thus far.

Explaining the system Mr. Beamer showed that instead of the train dispatcher calling up the operators at the stations and giving them orders, the new system requires the operators to ask for orders. He added: "Take three stations, designated A, B, and C. When a train pulls out of A, going in the direction of B, the operator at A notifies the operator at B that the train has passed his station. The operator at B then calls the dispatcher and asks for a block card from B to C. If the block shows clear in the dispatcher's sheet he gives B instructions to issue a block card. "Before the train leaves B, the operator at C and asks him to pledge the block between their stations. If the block is busy the operator refuses to pledge and immediately calls the dispatcher. "No train can pass a station without first receiving its block card, and instructions are issued to trainmen from station to station. Collision is impossible unless, of course, the three men make the same mistake at the same time."

Members of the interstate commerce commission, which body examines all devices and systems for moving trains, have commended Mr. Beamer, saying that in time the A. B. C. plan will be put into general use throughout the country.

Superintendent J. M. Rapelle of the Rocky Mountain division has not yet received any official confirmation of his appointment to the Idaho division and while his transfer seems assured nothing definite can be given out at present.

# PITTSBURG OFFICIAL FACES SERIOUS CHARGE

Pittsburg, May 11.—A warrant was issued for the arrest of Joseph G. Armstrong, director of the department of public works in the city of Pittsburg, charging him with forgery, perjury and false pretenses.

Director Armstrong is charged with unlawfully and fraudulently signing a pay roll on December 1, 1909, "for the purpose of cheating and defrauding the city."

He is also accused of unlawfully obtaining the signature of General Councilor Morrow to sign warrants for the payment of the money.
