MUCH INTEREST IS CENTERED
IN MOVEMENTS OF CANA-
DIAN PACIFIC.

Chicago, May 17.—Since a gateway to Chicago was secured by the Canadian Pacific through its purchase of the Wisconsin Central and the "800" railways its astounding prosperity has started many rumors of other purchases which LaSalle street and Wall street have regarded with interest. Anxieties which disturb the market concerning United States railways do not affect the Canadian Pacific and moreover the earnings record surpasses that of most of the western railways. For eight months to February 1 the net receipts were \$2,712,490, a gain of 17,680,000 over the influx of settlers is assurance of still greater gains in traffic and earnings. Also the immigration has meant the sale of 176,646 acres of its own land during 1909 at an average of \$13.50 an acre, although thousands of acres of the irrigated land in the great tract near Calgary were sold at \$9. The settlement of the Bow river valley tract this year has been at so rapid a rate that an official statement declares most of the company's land under irrigation will be disposed of by June 30. The traffic figures for the last year have been diminished by the fact that of a total wheat production last year of 166,844,000 bushels, the farmers of the dominion are still holding 18.28 per cent or nearly 30,000,000 bushels. The farmers of the prairie provinces are holding 18.99 per cent of their last year's wheat, or more than 25,600,000 bushels. These are striking and interesting figures, that illustrate the wealth of the dominion farmer. With wheat above the dollar mark it will be seen that the prairie province farmers are in good circumstances. They have the equivalent of a cash balance in bank of some \$26,000,000. They are holding this wealth in their own granaries, saving warehouse charges, and with the prospect of an increase in the value of this enormous grain store.

NABOBS ORGANIZE
TO FIGHT RAILROADS

Chicago, May 17.—The concentrated opposition of 175 big manufacturing companies to an advance in railroad rates took form here today in the permanent organization of individual organizations and companies into a big association to fight the roads. John E. Wheeler of Chicago was elected president. The selection of a name was for the time being delayed. E. J. McVann of the Commercial club of Omaha announced that western shippers probably would seek by injunction to prevent an increase in rates scheduled for June 1 from going into effect. A meeting to take final action, he said, would be held at Omaha May 25.

MAKING TESTS.

Trainmaster D. J. Hagerty of the Northern Pacific is making a trip with the dynamometer car. This car is run over the division to ascertain the tonnage that can be pulled by certain class engines.

GOES TO WALLACE.

Brakeman G. L. Stock of the Northern Pacific has been assigned to duty on the Wallace hill. He replaces Peter Ryan who goes into service on the west end out of Missoula.

BRANCH IS PLANNED

GREAT NORTHERN MAGNATE GIVES OUT INFORMATION IN HELENA.

The Miles City Independent gives the following account of a Helena interview with James J. Hill: "The Great Northern's Mondak-Lewistown line is to be extended into Helena via White Sulphur Springs, a total of 376 miles, was the announcement made in Helena by James J. Hill immediately after he stepped off the special train. This announcement has caused a bigger sensation throughout the state than the announcement of the building of the line southeasterly from Mondak to Lewistown, a distance of 288 miles. The building of this line means that Helena will be put into quick and intimate connection with Fergus county, without recourse to the Lombard gateway. It will also open up a wonderfully rich country."

TO LINE UP MISSOURI.

St. Louis, May 17.—Barney Schriber and assistants are backing a movement to re-establish horse racing in Missouri. They propose to submit to the voters at the fall election a bill to legalize the Paris-Mutual system of betting. The bill is to be submitted through the initiative and referendum, providing sufficient signatures can be obtained. Promoters opened offices here today.
