## COPPER ROAD RACES WITH SUMMER

FALSE WORK OF GREAT BRIDGE IN ALASKA RESTS ON INSECURE ICE.

Cordova, Alaska, May 19.—The builders of the great \$1,000,000 cantilever bridge of the Copper River railroad that will span Copper river diagonally between the Miles and Childs glaciers are engaged in a race with the summer. The falsework for the bridge was built on the six-foot ice of the river, and the steel is being put in place by men supported by the wooden scaffolding that rests upon the ice. Three feet of water is flowing over the ice and the ice may be swept out any day, and with it the falsework. If the bridge is not completed before the falsework is swept to sea the loss in extra labor involved will be \$150,000, beside the delay to the operation of the railroad. The erectors are working 18 hours per day in the bright Alaska sunshine, and high speed is maintained by a bonus of \$100 offered to each man if the bridge is completed before the ice goes out. Precautions have been taken against the loss of any of the steel in any event. By the time the river opens, the huge glaciers will have come to life and icebergs will fall from their faces, to flow to the

ocean and menace ships. But for the glaciers, emptying on opposite sides of the river, the bridge would not be necessary. Three thousand men are at work on the Copper River railroad, taking advantage of all of the daylight. A bridge across Tielke river at mile post 192 has been begun and the track to the steamboat landing at mile post 194 will be laid in a few days. Navigation is expected to open about May 25. Trains will probably be running to Chitina by July 16.

The Copper River railroad, under construction by the Morgan and Guggenheim interests, extends from Cordova to the Bonanza Copper mountains and will be completed before November 15.

**TEXAS TORNADO.**  
Houston, Texas, May 20.—Heavy windstorms on the coast last night and today blew down scores of houses and several substantial structures in a number of little towns. At Beaumont oil derricks were overturned. One death by lightning is reported.

**LEAVES FOR KYLE.**  
F. E. Wilson, who has been employed in the Puget Sound freight office here, left for Kyle yesterday. Mr. Wilson will take a position as operator at that station.

## QUAKE RECORDED.

Washington, May 20.—An earthquake, estimated to be from four to five thousand miles from Washington was recorded by the seismograph at Georgetown university this morning.

## PIOCHE BRANCH OPEN OUT OF SALT LAKE

Salt Lake City, May 20.—The San Pedro, Los Angeles & Salt Lake railroad today extended its regular train service from this end to Caliente, Nev. This extension will admit of the operations of the Pioche branch, which leaves the main line at Caliente. Heretofore since the flood of January, trains have been run only to Acoma, 20 miles east of Caliente. The rest of the line is on the old grade. The company is pressing work on the high line along the side of the Meadow valley wash and this will be in commission before flood time comes again.

## UNKNOWN LETS CARS TAKE HEAD FROM BODY

Helena, May 20.—(Special.)—An unknown man this morning laid down on the tracks at the Northern Pacific depot and allowed three cars, which were being shunted to a sidetrack, to head him. His head was severed from the body. There was nothing on the man's person to identify him. His appearance was that of a laborer; he was gray haired, wore a gray mustache and was about 45 years old.

## SPECTACULAR SUICIDE.

San Francisco, May 20.—In view of thousands of people in the downtown section of this city today, Nicholas Lichnik, a Greek leaped to his death from the 15th floor of the Claus Spreckels building, at Third and Market streets. His body was crushed into an almost shapeless mass on the paving stones, 200 feet below. On his person was a card bearing his name and an undertaker's receipt for \$75 in payment for his funeral expenses.

## ELBELIN TO PRISON.

St. Louis, May 20.—George Elbelin, who turned state's evidence and testified against Lowe, also charged with robbery, was sentenced in the federal court today to serve 18 years in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$3,000 for robbing the mails and holding up a

Missouri Pacific train near Glencoe, Mo. Yesterday Lowe was sentenced to 43 years.

## CLARA MORRIS SINKING.

New York, May 20.—Clara Morris, former actress, had a severe sinking spell this afternoon and her condition tonight was reported critical. The physician in attendance at her home in Yonkers says no hope remains that she will regain her sight and he is doubtful of her recovery.

## BROTHER IS REVENGED.

El Paso, May 20.—Released today after a year in jail for the killing of Fred Jackson, Madison Graham was shot and fatally wounded tonight by Marshall Jackson, a brother of the man he had killed. The men met on the street. Jackson opened fire without warning.
