The above officers were elected for the ensuing year at the annual meeting of the Montana State Sportsmen association which was held last evening in the rooms of the Missoula club.

The Butte Rod and Gun club medal was won by Frank Bartos of Helena with a score of 55. This event consists of five pairs of doubles from the 14-yard line, 15 singles from the 20-yard line, 15 singles from the 22-yard line.

Amateurs Star.

The most noticeable feature of yesterday's shooting was the way the amateurs held down the professional shooters. Although losing only one, Cascade and Missoula were tied for second place with 47 each.

Today will be the last day of the meet and interest has centered in the individual championship and in the handicap medal shoot. The individual championship is decided by a 50-bird contest. The handicap medal shoot is arranged in the following manner: The shooters who have averaged above a certain per cent will shoot from the 22-yard line, and according to per cent, down to the 16-yard line.

The last event of the shoot will be the consolation shoot. All the shooters will take part in this shoot, according to their average made during the preceding days. Those shooting 75 per cent or above, will shoot in one class. Those whose average runs from 75 to 85 per cent will be in another class, and those shooting below 75 per cent will be in a class by themselves.




