

EPWORTH LEAGUERS CONVENE

ANNUAL MEETING OPENS TODAY IN ANACONDA TO LAST UNTIL SUNDAY.

Anaconda, June 22.—(Special.)—The annual convention of the Epworth League of Montana convenes in the First Methodist church in this city tomorrow night to last until Sunday, June 26. One hundred and fifty delegates are expected to make this the largest religious convention ever held in Montana. A number of the delegates have already arrived, among them being Rev. and Mrs. P. A. Armstrong and Miss Dingman of Kalispell. A number of prominent speakers will be present, among them being Rev. R. P. Smith, president of the Wesleyan university at Salina, Kan., and Rev. Dr. Henry Y. Rasmus, pastor of the First Methodist church of Spokane.

The first session will be devoted to the addresses of welcome and responses. Lieutenant Governor W. H. Allen of Montana will welcome the visitors on behalf of the state.

AVIATORS ECLIPSED BY AUTO RACERS

THREE WORLD'S BUZZ-WAGON RECORDS BROKEN AT ST. PAUL AVIATION MEET.

St. Paul, Minn., June 22.—Three world's automobile records were broken at the Twin City aviation meet at the state fair grounds this afternoon. Barney Oldfield lowered the one mile and two mile records for a circular track and Ben Kercher set a new world's mark for three miles on a circular track. Oldfield driving his 200-horse-power Benz made both his records in the two-mile event. Taking a flying start he made the first mile in 49.45 seconds and the second mile in 50.15 seconds, making the time for the two miles 1:40. Both of his miles beat the former record of 50.4-5, held by Ralph DePalma. The best previous record for the two miles was 1:44.4-5, made by Oldfield at Los Angeles.

Kercher's new record for the three miles was made in a 100-horse-power Darracq, a former Vanderbilt cup winner. His time was 2:36.1-5. The former record of 2:38.4-5 was made by Ralph DePalma on the same track one year ago.

Glenn H. Curtiss, J. C. Marx and Charles F. Willard postponed their aeroplane events because of unfavorable weather, but gave several exhibition flights.

CITY OFFICIAL SUICIDES.

Salt Lake City, June 22.—Alma C. Reiser, deputy city license collector, killed himself in the private office of the city treasurer this afternoon by shooting. Falling eyesight and sickness in his family had made him despondent. There was no shortage in his accounts.

ROBBER IN HESSE KILLS TWO

EXPLODES BOMB IN FRIEDSBORG CITY HALL WITH FATAL RESULTS—SUICIDES.

Friedsborg, Hesse, June 22.—A desperate attempt at robbery here this afternoon resulted in two deaths and the wounding of several persons. A bomb was exploded at about 4.30 o'clock in the city hall. The roof, doors and windows were shattered and the staircases destroyed. During the confusion a masked robber entered the branch of the Imperial bank next door and drawing a revolver shot the manager in the neck. He seized a quantity of banknotes and gold and fled to the street. He then mounted a bicycle and dashed off toward Naumburg. A great crowd pursued the desperado who fired repeatedly. One boy was killed and two others wounded. The posse overtook him and finding he could not escape the robber fired his last shot into his temple, falling dead.

BIG OIL WELL IN PICTURES.

San Francisco, June 22.—The greatest oil well in the world, the Maricopa lakeview geyser, in the Maricopa field of central California, which has been spouting liquid fuel at the rate of 505,000 barrels a day since March 15, soon will be flashed on the screens of thousands of theaters and playhouses throughout the world. Recently representatives of a moving picture concern photographed this great geyser. Employees were shown at work, and to make the scenes resemble the early days of the spouter as much as possible, long rubber coats and appliances with which the army of men fought the big well for days and days, were brought into requisition and much life was thrown into the scene.

STATE PAROCHIAL SOCIETY MEETS

ANNUAL MEETING OF EPISCOPAL WOMEN OF MONTANA HELD IN GREAT FALLS.

Great Falls, July 22.—(Special.)—Following four days of enthusiastic and largely-attended sessions, the seventh annual convention of the Episcopal diocese of Montana adjourned late this afternoon. At the close the annual meeting of the Women's Parochial and Missionary society of the diocese was held.

While the meeting place of the next annual convention was not officially announced, it is understood that the honor will be given to Missoula. Reports of the secretary and treasurer of the Women's Missionary society showed that over \$13,000 had been contributed to parish work during the past year by the women of the diocese. A report of the pledges to Bishop Brewer's missionary fund showed \$1,000, a substantial increase over last year.

Mrs. C. H. Moore of Butte, treasurer of the society, announced that she had received \$265 toward the \$1,000 which is to be presented at the triennial meeting of the society next October. Each of the 29 parishes and missions in the diocese responded with pledges for the mission work in excess of those of last year.

Officers for the ensuing year were chosen as follows: President, Mrs. R. D. Hooker of Dillon; vice president, Mrs. J. L. Patterson of Bozeman; secretary, Mrs. P. J. Mearns of Great Falls; treasurer, Mrs. C. H. Moore of Butte.

They are members of the Geographical Society of Chicago and will go as a delegation of that organization to take part in a trip to be made by the Sierra club of California.

JEWELS ARE FOUND IN OLD PAIL

STOLEN DIAMONDS ARE FOUND BY DETECTIVES IN NOVEL HIDING PLACE.

Washington, June 22.—In an old, dust-covered pail, hanging from a rafter in the hayloft of a stable here, \$11,000 worth of diamonds and other jewelry were discovered today by detectives. For nearly four months, while the police of every city in the country have been endeavoring to trace them, the jewels had hung undisturbed in the barn where they had been hidden by Scott Winbush, a negro, who had stolen them from the home of Mrs. Rebecca K. Hornsby in this city.

Winbush, formerly employed by Mrs. Hornsby, had been accused of the theft. When confronted today by the new evidence unearthed by detectives, Winbush confessed and led the officers to the barn where the stolen property had been hidden.

GIRL IS ARRESTED ON MURDER CHARGE

Jackson, Ky., June 22.—Della Johnson, who disappeared after the affray last Monday at Jett's creek, in which Ashbury Fugate was killed and his mother wounded, was arrested today charged with complicity in the shooting. With her was captured Ashbury Spicer's 18-year-old son, who is also alleged to have assisted his father in the night with the Fugate family.

The Johnson woman is a sister of Elias Johnson, who is in jail on a charge of murdering Miles Crawford last week.

The examining trial in the Spicer-Fugate case is set for Thursday.

Many members of the rival families are here and a critical situation is expected when the case is called.
