**RAILROAD MEASURE CHAMPIONED**

**COMMISSIONER LANE DEFENDS BILL IN NOTABLE SPEECH IN SWITZERLAND.**

Berne, Switzerland, July 11.—Franklin K. Lane, member of the American interstate commerce commission, in a notable speech at a dinner tonight of the English-speaking delegates to the International Railroad congress, declared Europe misconceived the nature of the new American railroad law, which, he said, was less drastic than the English law.

"Congress," continued Mr. Lane, "has not fixed a uniform classification of freight, maximum or class rates on a mileage basis, or uniform terminal charges; yet, the English parliament fixed these 20 years ago. American legislation is based on English precedents, but is not nearly so radical. The American roads have realized that instead of injuring the roads, the regulations have helped them. All candid railroad men acknowledge that the new law will tend to stability of securities."

**COMMISSIONERS ORDER RECOUNT OF BALLOTS**

Pittsburg, July 11.—The county commissioners today granted the petition of Dr. R. J. Black for a recount of the ballots in the primary election of June 4 for the 20th congressional district, when Dr. Black opposed Congressman John Dalzell for the nomination. The commissioners had ordered eight boxes two weeks ago before they were stopped by a court injunction. This injunction recently was modified and the petition asking that all the boxes be opened was filed.

The recounting began shortly after noon today. It is expected the work will be completed tomorrow. Counting today Dalzell gained seven votes, making his plurality 404 instead of 257.

**CONTENDING SHIPPERS PLAN THEIR CAMPAIGN**

Chicago, July 11.—Action was taken today by a committee representing freight shippers from different sections of the country looking toward the employment of expert accountants and legal advisers for the allied shippers in the contest before the interstate commerce commission for lower freight rates.

Resolutions embodying the program of the shippers were adopted and will be presented for ratification to the general committee of 19, which was created at the shippers' meeting raise a fund to aid in the struggle for lower rates.

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**HOME GOVERNMENT WATCHES PITTMAN**

Washington, July 11.—Several consultations were held at the state department today on the possible action of the United States in connection with the removal of William Pittman, the American engineer, from Bluefields bluff to Managua. Pittman had been held for several weeks by the Madriz forces as a prisoner of war.

Acting Secretary of State Wilson has called in his international law advisers to aid him. It was said the government will instruct United States Consul Olivares to insist upon fair treatment for Pittman and watch the procedure at Managua with a view to guarding against injustice. Representatives of Madriz here claim that the Managua government was under no obligations to keep Pittman at the bluff. They point out that as early as March the government was notified that Madriz had instructed his subordinates not to act summarily with American prisoners but to send them forthwith to Managua. This step was taken, it is said, to insure the safekeeping of the prisoners.

Mail reports tell of the efforts of Madriz to raise money. Forced loans, it is said, are being exacted, particularly from those suspected of hostility to the Madriz government. The most frequent procedure is reported to be to make a demand for a loan, one-half to be advanced within 24 hours and the rest in three days with an increase of 25 per cent if payment is not forthcoming. Police or soldiers surround the house of the victim and shut off all means of securing food if the money is not paid. In one instance, it is said, the loan demanded amounted to \$10,000.

**HOMEOPATHS MEET IN PASADENA**

**ANNUAL CONVENTION OPENED IN CALIFORNIA WITH THREE HUNDRED ATTENDING.**

Pasadena, Cal., July 11.—Dr. James Ward of San Francisco, president of the American Institute of Homeopathy today delivered the opening address to 290 delegates at the annual convention which began its sessions here.

Dr. Ward recommended the appointment of a general financial treasurer, who would devote his entire time to the interests of homeopathy; said that voting members of the institute should be residents of the United States and Canada, and said that homeopathic colleges should go after larger endowments.

One hundred and thirty-five names were presented as applicants for membership and were referred to the board of censors.

Greetings were read from English homeopaths and an invitation was extended to visit London next July to attend a business convention.

**HAMILTON JURYMEN WILL BE COMFORTABLE**

Hamilton, July 11.—(Special.)—At a recent meeting of the board of county commissioners the members of the board were moved to compassion for the members of the jury, who were obliged to drag out the tiresome hours while listening to cases in the district court. This show of sympathy was brought about by the low-backed and hard-seated chairs that were furnished to the occupants of the jury box. Spurred to action by the belief that a jurymen does the best work when he is comfortable, the board voted to buy more comfortable chairs for the jury box. The chairs have arrived, along with a beauty for the clerk of the court, and have been put in place. With the opening of the next session of the district court it is expected that many of the jurymen impaled will forget the many excuses that have served to let them out of service, as the chairs present a most inviting appearance.

**WORK ON BUILDING PROGRESSES RAPIDLY**

Hamilton, July 11.—(Special.)—Work on the new public school building that is being erected in Pine Grove addition, on Fifth street, is progressing rapidly. The basement has been completed and the brick walls have advanced almost to the roof. Enough of the building has been erected to show that this addition to the public school property will be an ornament to the city. The building is well located, and will accommodate many of the smaller pupils living in the southern part of the city, as well as those of the Hart and Doran additions.

**SMITH-DONSON.**

Hamilton, July 11.—(Special.)—A pretty wedding was solemnized last evening at the Christian church by Rev. O. W. Jones, the contracting parties being E. E. Smith and Mrs. Eva Donson, both residents of this city. The bride was attended by her daughter, Miss Hazel Donson, while the groom was attended by Ray Lill. The bride and groom are well known here, the latter being one of Hamilton's progressive merchants. The ceremony was witnessed by members of the two families. Mr. and Mrs. Smith will make their home in this city.
