

# HEAT OPPRESSIVE IN KANSAS TWELVE SOLDIERS IN UPRISING

HIGH TEMPERATURES ARE REPORTED IN ALL PARTS OF THE MIDDLE WEST.

Kansas City, July 26.—A temperature of 103 degrees, the highest recorded here since July 22, 1901, was registered by the government thermometer at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The humidity hovered near the 40 mark all day. A half dozen prostrations were reported, but none of them was serious. The intense heat was general throughout the southwest and, according to the local weather observer, probably will continue until there is a general redistribution of barometric conditions. As a result of the heat and continued southerly winds in central Kansas, it is reported that crops are beginning to suffer. The state board of agriculture of Oklahoma, in a statement issued today, estimated the fruit damage there due to hot winds at between 45 and 55 per cent. Business was practically at a standstill this afternoon at Guthrie, where the temperature ranged between 108 in the shade to 119 in the sun.

Chicago Affected. Chicago, July 26.—This afternoon the wind shifted suddenly to the southwest and within an hour the thermometer rose from 83 to 94 degrees. Forecaster Cox predicts it will continue to grow warmer, with a likelihood of establishing a new heat record for the year.

Seven Deaths in New York. New York, July 26.—The mercury reached a maximum of 86 here today. Seven deaths occurred, as against 15 yesterday.

Springfield, Ill., July 26.—Mass meetings of miners were held today at Virden, Girard and several other places, at which the compromise agreement recommended by the representatives of the operators and miners was vigorously condemned and the resignation of National President Lewis of the United Mine Workers of America demanded.

RICH ORE. Wallace, July 26.—(Special).—Six feet of shipping galena was exposed at the end of a 500 foot crosscut tunnel driven on the Electric property near Murray. The strike was one of the most sensational made on the north side for a year. The controlling stock of the company is now in escrow to Pittsburg capitalists.

# GENERAL MINIET AT HEAD OF FAITHFUL DOZEN START CUBAN REVOLUTION.

Havana, July 26.—Senor Pasajodon, secretary to President Gomez, tonight issued a statement regarding the occurrences in Oriente province, which are believed to be the beginning of a widespread revolutionary movement. The statement says: "The government knows that General Miniet and 12 men took the field in insurrection from an unknown cause yesterday in the vicinity of El Caney. They have now taken refuge in a difficult, hilly country, where they are being hotly pursued by rural guards and infantry from the garrison at Santiago. Nothing is known of any other uprising."
