TO EXPAND MINING PROJECT

TRIANGLE COMPANY WILL BUILD A CONCENTRATING PLANT AT CLINTON SOON.

The Triangle Mining & Development company will build a concentrating plant at Clinton. Work will begin within 60 days and about \$50,000 be expended. A 100-ton mill will be erected to start with, and, if business justifies, it is to be enlarged. Those behind this project expect to solicit the co-operation of all those interested in properties in the copper district about Clinton and handle ore for all the mines of the community.

The Triangle company has been at work on the Clinton mine four years, but has not shipped any ore since the panic of 1907. Something like \$100,000 has been invested in development work and that much more will be devoted to the same line of work after the concentrator is put in. During the last 12 months the company has run a 700-foot cross-cut tunnel and opened a big vein of low-grade ore. It is necessary to have a mill to treat this ore, as it will not pay to ship it in crude form.

The Northern Pacific and the Milwaukee railroads contemplate putting spur tracks to the proposed mill.

"None of our stock is for sale," said a man who is interested in the Triangle outfit yesterday. "We are going to develop with our own money."

CIRCUS HORSE GOES UP IN BALLOON

FEATURE OF BARNUM & BAILEY SHOW IS FURNISHED BY ARABIAN STEED.

Those who attend the performance of the Barnum and Bailey greatest show on earth in Missoula, Saturday, Aug. 13, will see one of the most spectacular thrillers ever presented in America. This latest nerve-twisting device is in the form of a horse that makes a balloon ascension and descends to earth in a shower of fireworks. The name of the horse is "Jupiter." He is as handsome an animal as one sees in a lifetime. A beautiful young woman, with nerves of steel, accompanies him on his perilous voyage in the air.

Instead of the usual basket, a narrow platform is suspended from the balloon by four chains. The platform is barely large enough to hold the horse. It has no railing. There is no device in use to safeguard the splendid animal. The horse steps proudly into the arena. It is as white as snow and the girl who sits in the saddle is dressed in white from the tip of her dainty slippers to the plume in her hat. The horse steps onto the platform. The audience sits spellbound as the great gas bag, already inflated, lifts the animal and its mistress up into the dome of the tent.

When the highest peak of the arena is reached, the horse turns its head to one side and with its teeth takes hold of a leather strap which operates a battery of rockets and exploding mines. Jupiter gives the strap a jerk and immediately there is the hiss and sputter of a hundred pyrotechnical devices. A Niagara of flames and sparks comes tumbling down over Jupiter and the brave girl who rides him. The descent is made in a flood of fire stars and white smoke. Rockets fastened to the platform add to the danger and confusion. It is a moment of supreme suspense to the audience. If Jupiter steps to the right or to the left, or moves to the front or to the rear, to the extent of one inch, death will result to the horse and the girl. When the ground is reached in safety there are 10,000 signs of relief and storms of approbation. It is an admirable and audacious performance. It leaves its impress on the minds of the spectators for days to come.

No circus act of the past has so excited anything like the success of this spectacle. It differs absolutely from the so-called thrillers of the past, that are ghastly without any beauty to commend them, all made to assume a danger they do not possess by means of "bloomy rigging." There is no safety device about this act, no scientific secret to offer sure protection yet hint at death. The danger is real, self-evident, convincing. It amazes sight-seers. It almost robs them of the power to applaud.

This is the act that sensational Paris shuddered at. It made the whole European continent sit up with amazement. The young woman who rides the horse is an American, though the act was devised and perfected by a Frenchman. At Madison Square Garden in New York, where the act was first seen by Americans, Jupiter was given a reception that would have flattered the stars of the stage. At the completion of the act wreaths of flowers were hung around his white neck, men shouted till they were hoarse.

Two other surprises of sensational interest are the dive or Desperado and the performance of a chimpanzee, Charlie the First, who is the greatest bicycle rider and acrobat in the world.


